

Carroll High School History

Carroll High School is a Catholic, coeducational school located within the Archdiocese of Cincinnati. Carroll High School was born in concept early in 1960, named after Archbishop John Carroll, the first bishop of the United States. The site was blessed April 8, and the school mascot was chosen in June. Two area eighth graders, Bernard Middleton '65 and Larry Cowman '65, each won a transistor radio for their suggestion that Carroll be the home of "The Patriots" with the colors red, white, and blue. The enrollment of 400 (freshmen only) arrived for Carroll's first registration on August 19, 1961. The first day of school was on September 6, 1961.

Carroll High School's Distinguished Alumni Hall of Fame Selection Procedure

Carroll High School's Alumni Association established the Awards and Recognition Committee in May 2006 in order to evaluate criteria, research candidates, solicit nominations for alumni sponsored awards, and coordinate the planning and hosting of an annual awards ceremony. Being named to the Distinguished Alumni Hall of Fame is an incredible honor and is based on post high school achievements.

There are two categories for consideration: Alumni Distinguished Patriot and Honorary Patriot. The Alumni Distinguished Patriot Award honors Carroll graduates (at least 15 years out) who have made a significant impact on their communities and professions. The volunteer selection committee makes nominations and considers those received from alumni and the community. They solicit nominations from diverse backgrounds based on academic excellence, career achievement, Christian leadership, dedicated service, philanthropy, heroism, humanitarianism, and/or cultural enrichment, and then vote for the "best" of the "best." The Honorary Patriot Award honors those who are not Carroll graduates who have had a lasting and profound effect on Carroll High School, its students, and its community through their commitment to Catholic education and their active involvement, leadership, and support of the school.

Nomination forms must be received by the first day in November to be eligible for induction the following school year. Once candidates are nominated, their nominations remain active in subsequent years.

The committee is given descriptions of each candidate received from actual nominations, newspaper and web articles, or other forms of research. Then, the committee is divided into four sub-groups to discuss and research the nominees further and to assign a point value to them using an evaluation rubric supplied to them. If the sub-group determines that a nominee is eligible to be included on the official ballot, they will later share their findings with the rest of the committee. Prior to voting day, all sub-group recommendations for official ballot names are tallied and announced. A maximum number of 30 Distinguished Alumni Patriot names and a maximum of 5 Honorary Patriot names that received the highest scores are included on the ballot.

On voting day, there must be a two-thirds majority quorum present, and only those committee members present can vote. Voting day should be held at least six months prior to the ceremony. From the official roster (using a secret ballot), each committee member is required to select one Honorary Patriot candidate and five... (cont.)

Your fellow alumni, the administration, faculty, staff, and students of Carroll High School want it to be known that you are distinguished in our midst and shall evermore be remembered as a member of this honored Hall of Fame in which you are recognized and held up as an example of what it means to be a Carroll High School Alum, a true Patriot for Life, and an example of the ideals of Church, family, country, community, and service.

Be it so known. Be you so honored.

...Distinguished Patriot candidates. Votes are then tabulated and the top vote getters become the final awardees. In the case of a tie, another vote will occur on just those tied individuals. The committee determines the specific number of final awardees each year after the votes are tabulated.

The committee sets no quotas by gender, area of achievement or era, but diversity is encouraged. Members are expected to be unbiased & fair-minded. Also, the committee is sworn to strict confidentiality as to protect the nominees and maintain the highest standard of integrity.

The crest of Carroll High School is found on the Distinguished Alumni Hall of Fame plaques, as well as the awards given to the inductees. The crest of Carroll High School reflects both the spiritual and temporal objectives and ideals of the school's namesake, its faculty, and its student body. Surrounding the outside is the laurel wreath, the ancient and modern symbol of excellence both in academics and athletics.



The monogram "M" over the vertical olive branch in the center represents the Blessed Virgin Mary, to whom Archbishop John Carroll was intensely devoted. The slogan, *Via Pacis* (Way of Peace), recognizes Mary as our intercessor with Christ in obtaining that peace which the world cannot give.

The eagle is primarily the symbol for St. John the Evangelist, to whom the school chapel is dedicated. Soaring heavenward, it reminds us that we, too, should lift our hearts above earthly aspirations. Also well-known as an American symbol, the eagle urges us to be strong, to be sure, and to be satisfied only with the heights in both our spiritual and temporal lives.

The torch at the lower right represents the "lamp of learning" as well as the spirit that fired the Patriots of early America to love, to work, and to fight for God and Country. The plow of Cincinnatus identifies Carroll as being an institution within the Archdiocese of Cincinnati.

Overall, Christ's Cross with its open arms spanning the universe teaches men true freedom and how to enjoy its gift of peace here and hereafter.

Michael R. Gaines Class of 1986

Michael is one of the most well known marching band and winter guard designers in the world today. He has designed shows for the top high school marching bands and winter color guards on the national and international level. He is known for his ability to design shows that appeal to the crowd.

Michael is currently the Visual Coordinator and Drill Designer for the seven-time Drum Corps International World Champions and the Cavaliers Drum and Bugle Corps (Rosemont, IL). His designs have been featured by several high school Bands of America National Champions, as well as the three-time Winter Guard International World Champion, Pride of Cincinnati. Michael has had a wildly popular association with Pride of Cincinnati and Aimachi color guard and indoor percussion ensemble from Japan.

In addition to his work in the U.S., Michael has had the opportunity to design for groups on an international level, including two-time WGI Bronze Medalist Aimachi Color Guard and three-time WGI Bronze Medalist Aimachi Percussion Ensemble from Nagoya, Japan. Michael is an adjudicator and the featured clinician at events around the U.S., Japan, Thailand, Malaysia, and Colombia.

In April 2007, Michael was inducted into the Winter Guard International Hall of Fame. He has been the driving force for the WGI Board of Directors, as well as the Color Guard Task Force. He also created original computerized drill formations in the 2007 award-winning movie, [From the 50-Yard Line](#).

Michael is responsible for the birth and development of the Winter Guard program at Carroll. He wrote drill for the Carroll marching band for many years (until 2002). During his tenure as Carroll's director, the Winter Guard was a world-class finalist at the WGI World Championships every year and received the bronze medal twice.

Michael is a 1986 graduate of Carroll and currently lives in San Francisco, California. He has his BS from the University of Dayton and also his BFA from the San Francisco Academy of Art.

The greatest memories that Michael has of CHS revolve around the experiences he had, and the friendships he developed, from his involvement in the music program. The Orange Bowl trip and winning the 1983 Marching Bands of America Class A Championship stand out in his mind. He also enjoyed touring with the jazz band to the feeder schools with directors, Dave Luzio and Jeff Knies.

JP Nauseef, Carroll class of 1984, began his own business in 2008 to focus on helping high-tech businesses to capture new markets. Prior to his current role, JP was President and CEO of the Dayton Development Coalition, where he served a critical role for the region's economy. With the support of the Greater Dayton community, the region experienced the biggest economic development win in decades during the last round of the 2005 Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) proceedings. JP's efforts rallied support from federal, state and local leaders to protect and gain thousands of jobs at Wright Patterson Air Force Base. As a result, the base was strengthened in both size and importance at a critical time for our community. Throughout his career, JP has served on the Board of Directors of numerous Dayton organizations and has received many awards for his leadership: Air Force Association's Ambassador Award in 2006; Dayton Region Leadership award in 2005; Dayton Business Journal 40-Under-40 Award in 2001; and as an active duty officer: Air Force Space and Missile Center Officer of the Year in 1995 and Air Force Association State of California Officer of the Year in 1996. JP was inducted into Carroll's Inaugural Distinguished Alumni Hall of Fame in 2008.



Dr. Greg Notestine, Carroll class of 1971, is one of only 200 dentists worldwide who is accredited by the American Academy of Cosmetic Dentistry (AACD), one of four in Ohio, and the only one in the Miami Valley. Dr. Notestine has dedicated his professional life to helping others' smiles look and feel their best. As an internationally renowned expert, he is a published author, lecturer, and practitioner on the importance of evaluating and treating tongue-tied infants in order to help nursing mothers and babies through La Leche League, WIC (Women Infants & Children), and pediatrician referral. Greg has served on numerous Boards of Directors and consistently serves the community by volunteering at the Good Neighbor House Health Clinic and donating dental care for the working poor. Through the "Give Back a Smile" Program in the AACD, Greg donates cosmetic dental work to local recovering victims of domestic violence, restoring their smiles to help give back their self-esteem. Greg is also a consistent contributor and volunteer at Carroll, designing and providing athletic mouth guards for Carroll athletes, participating as a motivational speaker, and serving as President of the Alumni Association. Greg was inducted into Carroll's 2009 Distinguished Alumni Hall of Fame.

Reverend Victor F. Ries Honorary Patriot

Father Ries. The name alone speaks volumes to everyone familiar with Carroll's history and excellent reputation. As the school's first principal, Father Victor Ries was the educational and financial architect of Carroll High School at its inception, and his influence is felt to this day.

Father Ries completed his preparatory studies at St. Gregory and Mount St. Mary Seminaries and received a B.S. from the Teachers College, a B.A. from the Athenaeum of Ohio, and an M.S. in Education from Xavier University. He was ordained to the priesthood in October, 1945, and served as an associate pastor at several parishes prior to, during, and after his appointment as Carroll's principal in Aug., 1960.

As principal, he went to the Archbishop of Cincinnati and the Mother Superiors of various religious orders and asked for their top-notch teachers—and he received them. Each order controlled a different department, and no other area high school compared with Carroll in the quality of teachers. And he supported his teachers 100%. Sr. Judi Clemens, one of Carroll's original faculty members, states that "his leadership, his relationship with young faculty, and his openness to allowing students to exercise their leadership in very broadening ways were key [factors in leading] Carroll to where it is today." Though he was known to be a rigid taskmaster, Sr. Judi reflects that "he was a deeply sensitive man. The first 4 years saw the death of at least one student each year. He was there to help us cope with this."

Another former Carroll faculty member, Jerry Eilerman, notes: "It had to be an overwhelming task to start a high school from scratch and forge an excellent Catholic learning environment during a decade of change and turmoil. Putting together a team of nuns, priests, and lay faculty took leadership, dedication, and faith. He was a leader who inspired others to lead in and out of the classroom, and his dedication to both faculty and students was demonstrated every day. Even though Fr. Ries showed a stern exterior, he was a pussycat to those who knew him."

According to Rita Kroger, Carroll's long-time secretary and business manager who was hired by Fr. Ries, he was an absolutely fantastic financial manager, and once again, this is the reason Carroll is in the position it is today.

Fr. Ries died suddenly in his office at St. Peter Church in Huber Heights shortly after he celebrated Mass on January 30, 2003. No doubt the Lord in heaven welcomed him with "Well done, my good and faithful servant." Carroll High School couldn't agree more!

Julie (Thurman) Thorner Class of 1981



Julie is founder and president of Mini University, an employer-sponsored local company providing quality childcare and preschool at Wright State University, Miami University of Ohio, Miami Valley Hospital, and Montgomery County in Downtown Dayton. She sponsored two additional preschool locations in the Dayton Leadership Academy Charter Schools, serving low income families. The centers are based on quality standards by the National Association for the Education of Young Children, Resources for Infant Educators, and the Ohio Department of Education. "Mini U" is known for providing high quality early learning and using a servant leadership approach to working with their teams and sponsors. All of her centers have earned national NAEYC Accreditation and are star-rated in Ohio's Step Up to Quality system.

Julie's assertive leadership was instrumental in bringing a national research study to the Miami Valley, to improve the quality of Early Childhood teaching. She is an Advisory Board member of Montgomery County's early childhood initiative, *ReadySetSoar*, which focuses on Kindergarten preparedness for low income children. Theodore G. "Ted" Fecke Class of 1973

Ted is the Senior Leader for Propulsion, which is equivalent to a One Star General, for the United States Air Force. Ted has ultimate technical responsibility for all the aircraft engines in the Air Force inventory, which currently number approximately 10,000. As a result, he spends a great deal of his time checking on the condition of engines here in the United States as well as all over the world. Ted's extensive travel includes visits to Europe, Australia, and the Middle East.

Ted is held in very high esteem in the turbine engine field and is in constant demand to provide expertise and leadership. He was a visiting professor at Cranfield University, United Kingdom. As a member of the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics and the Society of Automobile Engineers, he has delivered many keynote speeches and has served as co-chair of numerous conferences.
