SPOTLIGHTS on our Patriot Student Community

A brief look at some of the current highlights from within and around our amazing student community.

ACADEMICS —

» Four seniors earn National Merit Scholarship commendation

Four members of the Carroll High School Class of 2022 added their names to the list of Patriots who earned recognition in the National Merit Scholarship program.

Vivian Dao, Claire LaMelle, Shannon McIntyre, and Max Weitz were named Commended Students by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC) and received a Letter of Commendation in honor of this accomplishment. The NMSC honored approximately 34,000 high school seniors nationwide with this distinction, and these students placed in the top 50,000 of students who entered the 2022 National Merit Scholarship competition by taking the 2020 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT).

Including these four students, Carroll High School has educated 109 Patriots who earned distinction as National Merit Scholarship Finalists, Semifinalists, or Commended Students since 2008.

"Those being named Commended Students have demonstrated outstanding potential for academic success," the NMSC said in a release. "These students represent a valuable national resource; recognizing their accomplishments, as well as the key role their schools play in their academic development, is vital to the advancement of education excellence in our nation. We hope that this recognition will help broaden their education opportunities and encourage them as they continue their pursuit of academic success."



» Celebrating family heritage in new course for Hispanic students

As the number of Hispanic students and families who choose Carroll High School grows, Carroll Spanish teachers noticed that the native speakers in their classes had different needs than the students who were learning to speak the language for the first time. Similar to how native English speakers need English Language Arts courses to strengthen their language mastery skills, they found that students who spoke fluent Spanish conversationally at home would benefit from a course that would strengthen their formal writing and grammar skills in Spanish. The World Languages Department launched Carroll's first Spanish course specifically designed for native Spanish-speaking students this academic year.

"It's a multicultural curriculum with emphasis on skillful, communicative competence," explained teacher Katie Nielsen. Though every student in the class speaks fluent Spanish, students' home countries and family traditions are very diverse. Albeit cultural differences, the course provides an inclusive environment for students. "Our multilingual students investigate and they celebrate and they interact with each other to learn about each other's cultures," said Nielsen.

For one activity, students had to choose a dish that is special in their family, research its origins, and present their findings and





their experiences with that food to the class. At the end of the lesson, students brought in their dish and shared it with the class. Giselle Demetrio Rodriguez '24 chose to share tamales, a Mexican dish consisting of meat and cheese that is wrapped in a corn husk, cooked, and shared at Christmas, birthdays, and other special events in her family.

Demetrio Rodriguez enjoyed sharing a piece of her family's traditions with her peers in the class. "I feel like we've created our own family in class," she said, "We know what it's like to grow up Hispanic. It's the connection we have." Nielsen and her students are proud to be a part of the development of this new course and to create an inclusive community for future Hispanic students at Carroll. Nielsen added, "We're excited to see (the program) grow and to give this community an opportunity to thrive in their native language and to encourage them to be more proficient in Spanish."

» STEM Grant brings farm-to-classroom experience for students

Thanks to a \$4,401 STEM grant from the Toshiba America Foundation (TAF), Carroll High School students are gaining hands-on experience in one of Ohio's largest industries.

Science teacher Todd Tayloe purchased an aquaponics station that the students will use to grow not only vegetables, but live perch, in his zoology and ecology classes. This introduction to aquaculture serves as a gateway for students to consider a career in a growing field. One-in-seven jobs in Ohio involve agriculture, and the United Nations estimates that 34% of all capture fisheries worldwide operate at unsustainable levels. Those factors combine to position aquaculture as a vital component of the food supply chain.

"As a high school teacher, I try to introduce career fields that might interest my students," Taylor said. "A lot of students are interested in STEM careers, but a lot of times they are biomedical based or engineering based. In the past few years in my Ecology class, I have introduced hydroponics into my classroom. With many different grants and donations, I have been able to purchase a grow tent, lights, and hydroponic equipment so the students can do inquiry based learning on where their food comes from. I also teach zoology so I wanted to come up with a way to merge the two classes together."

In the fall, two Ecology classes began the process of the aquafarming, and then in the second semester, two Zoology classes will take over and finish the growing and harvesting of the crops. Students across the hall in the Family and Consumer Sciences Department will use some of the harvest in their lessons for a cross curriculum experience.



-ART-

» Making art is a family affair for the Merlands

At an early age, Maya Merland '22 had access to all sorts of art supplies. Her parents, Steve and Renee Merland, encouraged their



daughter to create art at home. "She did stuff all the time," recalled Renee, "She was always drawing something on a piece of paper and bringing it to us." Little did Maya know at the time that she not only had very supportive parents, but that she was receiving support and feedback from two professional artists who both teach art as well.

As Maya grew older, she would turn to her parents for feedback and help with her art projects. It wasn't until later that Maya fully realized that her parents were more than art enthusiasts, as they shared their art and their experiences with her when she tried to do a self portrait in middle school.

Today, both of her parents teach visual arts at Carroll. Maya has been one of her mom's students for the last three years. With her mother's guidance, Maya has begun to hone her craft from realistic pieces to exploring more advanced, mixed media art as she focuses on shape, color, and line work while embroidering directly onto the canvas. Her work is not only impressing her

parents, but Maya is receiving recognition from the art world for her artistic form. "It's something you don't really see from artists at the high school level unless they're really confident in what they're doing," said Mr. Steve Merland.

Maya is now sharing her confidence as an artist with her younger siblings. "It's fun to have everybody (in my family) into art because we can have family art sessions and draw together," said Maya, who now enjoys crocheting with her mom at home and sharing links to creative artists online with her dad. "(Art) has brought us closer, and we have this whole other aspect of our relationship now," says Renee, "I'm really grateful that I've gotten this opportunity."



» Marching Patriots return to competition with award winning season

After the COVID-19 pandemic canceled all local and national marching band competitions in the fall of 2020, the Marching Patriots were eager to return to the competition circuit with their newest competition show, "Swipe Off, Look Up". Not only did the show feature original music by Carroll High School Director of Bands Carl Soucek, but the band wore custom uniforms that emphasized the show's themes of human relationships in the digital age.

The band and guard added to the program's tradition of success with a first place finish in the AAA division of the Mid



States Bands Association Lebanon Invitational. The Marching Patriots also earned awards for Best Music, Best Visual, Best General Effect, and Best Color Guard at the competition. The ensemble also brought home trophies for a second place finish at the Bands of America Regional Championship and third place finish at MSBA Class AAA Championships.

» Freedom Players perform a comedy about a tragedy

This past fall, the Freedom Players returned to the Carroll stage to perform *Daddy's Girl*. In the time leading up to the production, Director Toni (Hemmert) Weitz '86 knew many students and theatergoers would be unfamiliar with the show. "I have had people ask me what the play is about," Weitz said, "and I tell them the story: wife dies in childbirth, husband gives baby up for adoption, husband talks to dead wife and can't move on with his life 25 years later, etc. They respond, 'Sounds sad,' and I say 'It's a comedy!"

With a mixture of kooky characters appearing in the main character's diner (and even inside of a framed picture on the wall of the set), the show found ways to transform a somber storyline into a funny, joyful performance. After the complications affecting recent Freedom Player performances, students were overjoyed to get another chance to share their talents onstage. For Breanna Lawton '22, the show was an opportunity to perform onstage for the first time while also



helping build the set and managing the stage makeup department. "It pushed me to my limits, but it allowed my creativity to grow," Lawton recalled, "It was probably the best experience I will ever have in Drama Club."

The adult production team consisted of many Freedom Players alumni who, much like Lawton, enjoyed their experiences so much that they continue to assist in current productions. In addition to Mrs. Weitz, Assistant Director Abby (Wiles) Merkle '11, Stage Directors Joshua Weitz '09 and Andrew Becker '09, Costume Designer Lynn (La Pierre) Brown '68, and Technical Advisor Andrew Connair '20 worked together to allow the students the opportunity to bring joy to audience members night after night of the show's successful run.

» Freshman inspires prayer through creative service project



Though service hours are not a graduation requirement at Carroll High School, students, like Madeline Kramer '25, choose creative, profound ways to give back to the community. Of the 268 of the service hours she's performed this school year, Kramer has spent over 180 hours creating and giving 150 rosaries to others so far.

What started as a craft project with her fellow youth group members at Ascension Parish last July became both a way for Madeline to relax after a long day of school and for her to give others a tool for deeper prayer connection. Her youth group has used them for fundraisers, but most she gives away for free to others who are in need of a rosary.

"To see something I so love doing bring joy to somebody else is just so heartwarming," Kramer said, "I love the impact that it's making in my community around me."

» Volleyball team helps spike brain cancer at fundraiser

Every year since 2012, Stephen Beach '05 and his sisters Ashley Garcher '03 and Renee Sample '07 have organized a 5k run/walk to raise money for brain cancer research in memory of their father, Tim. When they needed a large group of volunteers to help with the 2021 event, the Beach family reached out to Carroll Volleyball Coach Tim O' Brien '08 who also experienced the loss of his father to brain cancer. Dozens of students, parents, and staff members answered the call to serve and pitched in to make the event a success.

The 10th annual Hope... It's a Beach Thing returned to the campus of the University of Dayton on a chilly October Saturday after a virtual-only event in 2020. O' Brien and his family have participated in the event since his father Tom passed away in 2017. Seeing the impact the event makes on people battling brain cancer and knowing the need for volunteers to ensure its success, O' Brien and the rest of the volleyball program were eager to help. The team helped with check-in and registration, encouraged runners and walkers along the route, and pitched anywhere they were needed.

"I heard a lot of great things from the team about the people who walked, and I heard great things from all the people who walked about our kids and how enthusiastic they were," O' Brien said. "It was great to see them understand how much it meant to me because of my personal connection." To Beach, the team's willingness to give up part of a free weekend in the middle of their season served as a reminder of how Carroll calls its students to be more and do more for their community.



"My family's values align with service and humility within the Catholic faith," Beach said. "We grew up with that, and Carroll reinforced it even more in us. I wasn't surprised when we saw the response from Carroll with the support and big waves of people coming to the event to help us out. It's a testament to those values and principles that Carroll tries to instill in its students."

The 2021 event raised more than \$55,000 that the Beach family will donate to Dr. David Reardon, the Clinical Director of the Center for Neuro-Oncology at the Dana-Faber Cancer Institute, and the event has raised more than \$544,000 since it began. O' Brien said contributing to moments like this reaffirm his commitment to the event and Carroll High School.

"We call it giving back for a reason, and moments like this make it easy to work at a place like Carroll. When you have a large community that supports us as a family and a greater cause as the Carroll family, it shows the impact Carroll High School makes on a lot of people. We wouldn't be able to do what we do with the walk without all of the volunteers. It reaffirms why we are at Carroll."

When I walked into Carroll for first time as a freshman, didn't know anyone. I didn't go to any of the feeder schools. and I was the first in my family to attend Carroll. It was many times larger than my old school, and while the faces were friendly, were none familiar. I was worried that I would get lost in what seemed like

a confusing myriad of hallways. This feeling didn't last long though. By the end of the week, I had found friends from my classes and joined several clubs (and figured out how simple the building layout is.)

One of my first days, I saw Mr. Sableski standing out in the hall, waving to students and chatting as they walked by. I had met him briefly once before, but didn't even think about saying, "hi"; I didn't expect him to remember one new student out of the nearly 200 freshmen. Mr. Sableski greeted me by name. I was shocked that someone who is

so busy, responsible for so many students, would take the time to learn and remember my name.

Carroll also has a unique way of strengthening its community. Unlike the homeroom system of many other schools, Carroll students stay in the same Family Room all four years with people from every grade. We play card games, give help with homework, and have holiday parties complete with food and decorations. I've been able to get to know students from different grades and who run in different social circles. I now have friends who I never would have gotten to know otherwise. We don't take the same classes, play the same sports, or join the same clubs, but by spending time together in Family Room, we've found interests and beliefs in common.

It's common for people to feel a sense of belonging and camaraderie within a small group such as a team, but a high aspiration for a school of hundreds of students and teachers. Carroll is set up for just that. It makes students feel comfortable and welcome from the very beginning. It is an environment where students are able to create meaningful relationships with their peers. It isn't about how long you've been here or where you came from. If you are a part of Carroll High School, you are part of a family.












Even in a tightly knit family of nine, Dan Austria '80 remembers the special bond he shared with his brother David '79. The third and fourth children of Dr. Clement G. and Jean Austria, David and Dan were born less than a year apart, and were the same chronological age a few weeks each year during August.



David Austria '79

Like many brothers growing up in a large household, they would help maintain four of the sprawling 12 acres which the Austria family called home Xenia. Dan remembers fierce competitive battles with his older brother, including early morning races to determine who would arrive first at the best mower when it was time to cut the grass. He also recalls their fights

for supremacy on the backyard family basketball court.

"Neither of us ever wanted to lose, but through competition we developed love and respect for each other," said Dan.

As a first-year student entering Carroll High School in the fall of 1976, Dan remembers how his brother (then a sophomore) prepared him for what was to come. He fondly recalls their 30-minute car rides to and from school.

"He was always available to ease my mind whenever I felt insecure," said Dan. "Over time, we shared a special bond and became each other's confidants."

After high school graduation, Dan once again followed his brother to school, this time to Marquette University in Milwaukee. David, following his father's footsteps, decided to study medicine, while Dan majored in pre-law.

"There was something about attending the same school together that brought us even closer," said Dan.

While they never roomed together, their intense basketball rivalry continued at Marquette's Helfaer Recreation Center. "Some things changed when we moved to Marquette, but other things didn't," recalled Dan fondly.

While attending medical school at the University of Cincinnati in 1984, the unthinkable happened. David discovered a lump on his arm, which doctors initially did not diagnose as cancer. Another examination several

months later revealed cancer, setting into motion a twoyear treatment program designed to put the disease into remission.

"That news was extremely difficult for me to process," said Dan. "But I always remained there for him, in the same way he was always there for me."

Several years passed until 1991 when doctors discovered the cancer had returned. Doctors shared the dire news that David's condition was now terminal. Despite his grim prognosis, David demonstrated tremendous courage by continuing to practice medicine during his residency, until his illness eventually made it impossible for him to keep going. In his remaining time, David stayed active by teaching religious education classes, and counseling children and young adults also suffering from terminal illness. Empowered by his Catholic faith and devotion to Christ, David made a positive impact on members of his community right up until his final days. He succumbed to cancer in 1993.

"Losing my brother was tremendously painful," said Dan. "But I always reminded myself about David's deep faith in God and his spirit to keep fighting. He was an inspiration to everyone."

Led by his mother, Jean, the Austria family established an annual award for a new Carroll student to keep David's memory alive. With the help of the Xenia Knights of Columbus, one student entering Carroll High School is selected to receive a full tuition scholarship, in the name of Dr. David Austria.

"David told me during his final days that he did not want to be forgotten," said Dan. "Hopefully, this award will always remind the Carroll High School community of David's undying spirit and faith.

us how to always trust God and keep love in our hearts, despite whatever difficulties we may face."

Dan, with his wife Tracey, are also honoring the memory of David in a more visible way. By donating a substantial gift through Carroll's "Foundation of the Future Capital Campaign," Carroll's aging science labs are now completely updated and refurbished.

Dan remembers taking science classes in the seventies in Room 111, which has largely remained unchanged until his family's generous donation. David's lifelong love for the sciences prompted the Austria family to act.

"Having spent only 31 years on this earth, David taught us how to always trust God and keep love in our hearts, despite whatever difficulties we may face."

"We hope this encourages Carroll students to pursue a career in the sciences," said Dan. "We wanted students to have access to top-notch science labs to prepare themselves for college in the STEM fields of study. Hopefully, some of them are as enthusiastic about science as David was."

Dan and his wife Tracey have operated a successful financial planning firm in the Dayton area for more than 30 years. Recently, Dan's youngest son, David - a Carroll valedictorian in 2016 - has joined his father in the business. "The greatest honor I could ever give to my

brother was to name my youngest son after him," said Dan. "He is like my brother in so many ways: the physical resemblance, his mannerisms, and his bond with his brother, Matthew '10, and sister, Amy '12."

Dan's son, David, a fully licensed CPA, enjoys listening to stories about his uncle and embraces the legacy. "He knows how important family is to all of us," Dan says. "He sees how close we are to our

siblings. Even to this day, we still enjoy spending time together, and he honors his uncle by sharing that tight family bond that we all have."

The next time you're walking through Carroll High School, peek into Room 111, where the "David M. Austria STEM Lab" is located. You'll see a facility that's contemporary, updated, and fully prepared to propel future scientists and medical professionals to the next stage of their careers. But even more importantly, you'll be reminded of a great man who is gone, but certainly not forgotten.



Families continue to build their legacy at Carroll High School as more and more second and third generation Patriots begin their high school careers. One of those families is the Brewster/McGarry family. As the years pass and seasons of life change, Kathy (McGarry) Brewster 70 and her daughters have impacted the lives of dozens of Patriots in honor of her husband who sacrificed his time, talent, and treasure not only for his loved ones but complete strangers.

Kathy remembers meeting Robert Brewster '70 during their year freshman as members of Carroll's sixth graduating class. He worked with her sister, Patricia (McGarry) Morrisey '69 at a restaurant close to their homes. Unlike most teenagers with jobs, Robert spent his money on his Carroll tuition to ease the burden his family after his father died, leaving his

mother alone to raise him and seven siblings.

Bob, as Kathy calls him, was a frequent visitor to the McGarry house after school dismissal or the end of a shift at Mr. Steak. She never considered dating Bob until December 1969 after some encouragement from her mother. They had an instant connection, Kathy recalls, and went to Turnabout and Prom together as they finished their days as Carroll students.

Seven years later, Bob was preparing to move to Toledo for medical school. On Christmas Eve 1977, he told Kathy that he needed to run an errand at Carroll and convinced her to come along. As they approached the main entrance, Bob turned around, bent his knee, and asked Kathy to be his wife on the front steps of Carroll High School. A year later, they married at St. Helen Church. They would return from Toledo in 1981 after Bob finished medical school and settle back in Riverside to start their own family in the neighborhood where they grew up.

Bob opened his own medical practice in Beavercreek with his partner and Kathy worked as a nurse. The Brewsters always planned to send their children to Carroll High School to receive the same quality education that they did when the school was in its early years. That vision became a reality when their oldest daughter, Meghan '01

began her time as a Carroll student in the fall of 1997. Their younger daughter, Colleen '05 started in the fall of 2001 right after her older sister graduated.

"We started getting more and more of the stories from Dad and his Wednesday friends of him playing football, their teachers, and things like that," Meghan says. He had the same group of friends from Carroll through adulthood, and they would get together every Wednesday to play cards, roller-skate, or play tennis depending on the weather."

Like her parents, Meghan met her future husband, Sean Harshman '01, as a Carroll freshman and stays in contact with many of her classmates. Colleen also speaks with her closest friends from Carroll daily through text message group chats and when some of them visit her salon for a fresh hairstyle.

"It had a similar impact on me," Meghan says. "I have a similar group of friends from Carroll that I still hang out with on a weekly basis. It prepared me well for college and medical school. I had fun both in my classes and theater."

During Meghan's senior year of high school, the Brewster family received news that would change their lives. Kathy accompanied Bob to Colorado for a medical conference and ski trip in December 2000, and he suddenly started experiencing severe headaches. On their Saturday flight home, Bob told Kathy that he wanted his medical partner to order an MRI the coming Monday. The test uncovered a tumor, and Bob was diagnosed with brain cancer. Bob continued to practice medicine at his practice as well as spend many hours as a volunteer after his diagnosis. While the girls were sad that their father was not with them at those moments, they understood that the people he was helping desperately needed his time and care.

"He would repeat that all the time, how lucky he was to be able to do that," Kathy says. "He was born and raised Catholic and had strong feelings about his faith."

Bob frequently shared with others his appreciation of

his Catholic education in preparing him for higher education and life's challenges. Dr. Brewster used his faith, optimism, and sense of humor to comfort and entertain his family, friends, and patients through his 21-month struggle with brain cancer. He died on November 26, 2001.

Shortly after Bob's death, the Brewster family endowed and awarded a scholarship to make a Catholic education at Carroll High School possible. Kathy remembers how much being a Carroll Patriot meant to Bob and his sacrifices at a young age to make it possible. Alleviating some of that burden for students like Bob is one of the ways the Brewster family keeps his memory alive.

"I want them to know that they're supported and have the help they need to be here and get the same advantages that we all had at Carroll," Kathy says.

The family has awarded scholarships to a total of 35 Carroll students from 2001 through 2021, and they are reviewing applications for the 36th recipient. In total,

the scholarship has provided more than \$52,000 in much needed financial assistance for Carroll families over two decades.

A third generation of the Brewster family now attends Carroll High School. Colleen's daughter, Ella Carusone '25, began her high school career this past fall. Ella's early nerves about the transition to high

school quickly disappeared on freshman orientation day, and she has grown to embrace the increased autonomy and responsibility that comes with being a high school student. She's enjoyed making memories in classrooms and in the student section under the Friday night lights during football season like the previous generations of her family as well as experiencing Carroll's unique House System as a member of Baltimore House, a first for the Brewsters. Her grandmother and aunt jokingly remind her to be careful who she dates over the next four years because she might end up marrying her high school sweetheart.

"I want them to know that they're supported and have the help they need to be here and get the same advantages that we all had at Carroll."

Jack Agnew '23: A Family foundation for championship success

Kevin '21 and Jack Agnew '23 ran before they could even walk. Their mother Christine would put them in a stroller as infants and take them out with her as she ran in the Bellbrook neighborhood surrounding their home as many as seven miles at a time.

"I ran every day with them in a jogger," Christine recalls." We would take books, snacks, and sippy cups and go. They'd fall asleep, wake up, sing me songs from kindergarten."

The Agnew boys were all but born to run. Longtime Carroll High School Cross Country Coach and 2006 Athletic Hall of Fame member John Agnew '80 met Christine outside of a gym on the grounds of Wright Patterson Air Force Base in 1997. John was heading in for a workout as Christine was heading in for a run. Their shared enthusiasm for running and fitness helped them grow closer throughout their relationship. Christine competed in the prestigious Boston Marathon as John cheered from the crowd, and once they were engaged to be married in 2000, John finished in

first place at the Air Force Marathon on the morning of his bachelor party.

Before they were all-state caliber runners for Carroll Cross Country, Kevin and Jack were toddlers hanging around practice and traveling to the team's state camp with their parents. They eventually started running with their dad in local parks and competed in their first ever race at the Meatball Madness 5k in Beavercreek when Kevin was in third grade and Jack was in first grade. Kevin and Jack spent more hours swimming for their club team than running cross country trails growing up, but Kevin's freshman cross country season in 2017, followed by Jack's two years later, marked a significant milestone for the entire Agnew family.

"It was really special," John says. "I had coached all these other kids all these years which was great, but [Kevin and Jack] were always part of the program. When they started competing for Carroll, that was neat."

Kevin would sometimes have to answer questions about the drawbacks of having his father as his coach, but the answer reflected his family's shared passion for the sport.

"It was a lot different because it was a much different dynamic in the youth program. The races were much more different and had a team focus, which I really liked. It's nice to have your coach there all the time and have a better relationship with him from the start," Jack says. "It really helped in my development because we had such a strong bond going into it."

At the end of Kevin's high school running career, he was scheduled to run for the 3200m Track and Field District Championship in his home city of Bellbrook on the same night he would receive his Carroll High School diploma and give his Valedictorian speech to his family, friends, and classmates.

"It went by very fast," Kevin remembers. "There was the Senior Awards Ceremony in the morning, too, so I was only home for a short time that day. I liked having graduation as



something to keep my mind off the race, because the whole day leading up to and when I gave my speech, I was focusing on my speech and how I would be calm. Once that was done, it was a sudden transition to getting ready to race. I really enjoyed that day."

"All the coaching and parenting was done, so it was an opportunity to just watch and enjoy," John says. "I loved his speech, and he ran an awesome race because it was a loaded field."

Kevin would go on to win the District Championship in a record setting time and eventually compete for the State Championship in the event to end his Carroll career. A few months later, his younger brother began his own championship journey.

Jack carried the lessons he learned from his parents and brother with him as he supplemented his runs with stretching, lifting weights, and core work throughout the summer with the goal of winning a state championship in mind. After winning all but one race during the season, Jack entered the OHSAA Division I State Cross Country Championship as the GCL Co-ed, District, and Regional Champion with his teammates at his side at Fortress Obetz just outside of Columbus. He was one of a handful of runners with a realistic shot at winning the race but would have to overcome the only person to beat him earlier in the season as well as overcome concerns about his ability to pull away from the pack at the end of the race. Once most of the field dropped back, Jack found himself running step-forstep with the leader just the length of a football field away from the finish line. After questioning his own ability to close out a race against elite competition, Jack opened up a 2.5 second lead in the final kick of the race to earn the first cross country championship in Carroll history.

His big brother, now a runner for The Ohio State University Cross Country Team, watched Jack win from the stands. Christine watched from behind and did not have a clear view of the finish, and John sprinted from his spot outside the stadium where he watched the other Carroll runners just in time to see Jack cross the finish line.

"It meant a lot because I had been working at it for so long,

and that's been a goal of mine going back many years before high school," Jack says. "Right after I crossed the line, it was different than anything I had ever felt before. Shock and happiness, I was very excited. The biggest reason I was able to be successful is having my teammates there. They take away so much stress. If you have to train on your own, it makes it a lot less fun, and you don't have as much of a purpose to do it. Knowing they're pushing during the race helps me push my hardest."

That camaraderie is the foundation of the Carroll Cross Country program that John has built over the decades as head coach. The team grows closer over many of the activities that many families do together like traveling for overnight trips and competitions in and out of the season, canoe rides, and beach days. The bond strengthens with program alumni throughout their lives. John was a groomsman for one of his former runners, Charlie Middleton '94, and estimates about 30 cross country alumni attended the wedding as guests.

"It can't just be about the running," John says. "It has to be about making connections and building bonds. We have alumni get togethers, and a lot of our alumni are close with their teammates many, many years later."
