

PATS CAMP: INSPIRING FELLOWSHIP & SPORTSMANSHIP



PATS Camp makes sports dreams a reality for athletes with adaptive needs

This summer will mark the 10th annual PATS Camp, a summer program offered free of charge for children with special needs to learn about and participate in a wide variety of sports in a safe and inclusive environment. Unlike other camps offered for the special needs community, campers have a 1-on-1 Carroll student volunteer working and participating alongside their camper throughout the four days. At the end of the camp, participants have a field day filled with celebrations and a slide show of camp memories for the campers and their families.

In the camp's inaugural summer of 2014, Allie Monell '18 was eagerly awaiting to begin high school when she



received the opportunity to volunteer at this new Carroll summer camp. Fellow cheerleader and upperclassmen Hannah Keller '17 was spearheading the camp. "No one really knew what it was then," recalled Monell, "but I remember how much fun we all had that year and how special it was."

Allie continued to volunteer with the PATS Camp program and was so impacted by her involvement that she eventually took over the program as its coordinator in 2022. Under her care, Allie has built on Keller's programming and has been able to work with families to provide additional accommodations for campers, including a sensory-friendly sporting experience in the auxiliary gym for campers who want to participate without all of the louder sounds typically involved in sporting fun.

Though the camp has evolved, Allie loves seeing many of their previous campers and their families return year after year to have fun. "It's something really special to watch and to see them grow over the years," said Monell. Inspired by her many years working with PATS Camp, Allie now works as



an intervention specialist educator. Through this new lens, Allie now sees the camp's incredible ability to provide an opportunity for neurodivergent and neurotypical peers to form a bond and greater confidence in interacting with each other- something that is inspiring for both campers and the Patriot student volunteers.

Though her work as camp coordinator is voluntary, her yearly experiences with PATS camp are time well spent. Says Allie, "It's really rewarding to see the joy that it brings to the campers, their families, and the student volunteers. It makes it all worth it."

ACADEMICS



FIVE CARROLL SENIORS EARN SPOTLIGHT FOR NATIONAL MERIT SCHOLARSHIP TEST PERFORMANCE

Kyle Heilmann and David McLoughlin are two of approximately 7,000 students in America that have qualified as National Merit Scholar[®] Finalists for their performances on the 2023 PSAT. These seniors will continue in the competition for National Merit Scholarships worth nearly \$28 million.

Neil Tivakaran and Sydney Ramsey earned Commended Scholar status, and

Alyssa Applin was chosen by the College Board for the National African American Recognition Award. This Recognition Award program grants underrepresented students with academic honors that can be included on college and scholarship applications and connects students with universities across the country, helping them meaningfully connect to colleges and stand out during the admissions process. Since 2008, Archbishop Carroll High School has helped 110 students earn the distinction of Commended Scholar, Semifinalist, or Merit Scholar through the NMS program.

CROSS-CURRICULAR LEARNING HIGHLIGHTS CATHOLIC SOCIAL TEACHING THROUGH LITERATURE

City of Dayton Commissioner Matt Joseph '90 joined freshman English classes for a discussion of Warren St. John's novel *Outcasts United* and the Welcome Dayton program for immigrants who now call Dayton home. Joseph shared how Welcome Dayton provides support to people like the refugees in the book and how the seven themes of Catholic Social Teaching call us to welcome our new neighbors.

GRANTS KEEP STEM LEARNING SPACE MODERN TO HELP MEET THE NEEDS OF TOMORROW

Students studying Ecology and Zoology at Carroll will continue learning about the latest innovations to one of Ohio's largest industries thanks to a state grant.

The Ohio EPA awarded Science Teacher Todd Tayloe nearly \$3,500 to replace components of the hydroponic ecosystem in his classroom and purchase walleye fish, plants, food, heaters, and pumps to maintain the symbiotic environment.

Tayloe says this hands-on learning experience provides students with a look at careers in agriculture, a sector that contributes \$124 billion each year to Ohio's economy.



"This is my way of teaching them the class material but adding an agricultural aspect to it," Tayloe said. "Technology and innovation keep advancing in hydroponics like anything else. This is the next round of what's coming and might keep them in Ohio and find a really good paying job."

FREEDOM PLAYERS KEEP FALL PRODUCTION IN THE FAMILY

This past fall, the Archbishop Carroll Freedom Players put on the play *You Can't Take it With You*. The story revolves around Alice and her quirky family, the Sycamores, and how they interact in their shared New York City apartment. When Alice wants to bring her love interest and his family home for dinner, chaos ensues.

Gabriel Lavender '24 starred as Sycamore family patriarch, Paul, and reflected on his own family. "I used what I learned from my father and grandfather," Lavender said of his inspiration for the role and in life. He also received support from his mother. "I also want to thank my mom for telling me to always try my best at everything in life, as without her encouragement, I doubt I would have joined drama club in the first place," Lavender said.



MARCHING PATRIOTS HIT A HIGH NOTE WITH REGIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

For the first time in more than three decades, the Marching Patriots finished in first place in a Bands of America competition.

The band and guard took the top spot at the Bands of America Central Ohio Regional Championship in the 1A division with their show, *Open Mic* as well as a second place finish at the Mid States Band Association Championships. The show featured arrangements of jazz hits that displayed soloist skills of individual musicians.

The Marching Patriots capped off their season with a performance at Bands of America Grand Nationals in Indianapolis and a weeklong trip to Orlando in December for a clinic with musicians at Walt Disney World.

CARROLL JUNIORS EARN 14 SCHOLASTIC ART AWARDS

Four members of the Class of 2025 combined to earn 14 Scholastic Awards for the 2024 academic year. Allison Arias-Rodriguez '25, Collette Merland '25, Allison Walls '25, and Tessa Zimmerman '25 won seven honorable mentions, six Silver Key Awards, and one Gold Key Award. Zimmerman's Gold Key Award piece Not Everything is Black and White will go on to be judged at the final, national level of the Scholastic Art Awards for a chance to be displayed in New York City this summer.

The regional Scholastic Art Award winners were displayed at the K12 Art Gallery in Dayton from February 3 - 24 with a special ceremony for the regional Scholastic Art Award winners on February 24.

The Scholastic Art & Writing Awards were founded in 1923 and have inspired bold ideas in creative teens throughout the country. Award recipients through the years have included greats like Andy Warhol and Ezra Jack Keats.

SERVICE AND GRATITUDE: A RECIPE FOR SUCCESS




The Military Kids Club and Women's Basketball program partnered to bring some holiday cheer to the men and women of the US Air Force this Christmas season.


BROTHERLY LOVE FOR CARROLL'S COURTYARD

The most common things make the biggest difference when you're 4,800 miles from home.

"I was surprised by how big the roads and the cars are in America," Noemi Fedorisinova '26 recalled – just one of many eye-opening experiences from when she and her family arrived in the United States from their native Slovakia. Unlike many families who left eastern Europe in 2022, Noemi, her sister Sofia '24, their parents, and their brothers were not fleeing the burgeoning war between Russia and Ukraine. Their father, Francis, is a Byzantine Catholic Priest who had been urged by a bishop in 2019 to relocate his family to the United States to help grow their ministry.

The family spent months in deliberation and prayer to make a decision. They ultimately decided to leave behind their comfortable lives in Slovakia to answer the bishop's call of spreading their faith. The onset of the COVID-19 pandemic put their plans on hold, but the family arrived in Charlotte after a 24 hour journey from Budapest.

"There was also sadness because I had made good friends and was in a good high school community," Sofia said. "It's important for our family to make decisions together and make sacrifices for the church and our faith. It's important to be able to sacrifice even the great life that we had in Europe. Everything was perfect there, but we sacrificed it to help people here."

After adjusting to the weather, tweaking their English dialect from British to American, and bouncing from Charlotte to Cleveland to Dayton, the family settled into their new life.

"For my first three months of school, I was just sitting and doing nothing because I was so stressed. I tried to speak, but it was bad. Then when I went to high school, I started to talk and make friends and things got better. The teachers are always trying to help you, and I really appreciate that."

Sofia and Noemi also learned about the differences between the Roman Catholic and Byzantine traditions while attending Catholic schools. Their father leads the St. Barbara the Great The Fedorisin family gathered in the Dormition of Mother of God, Byzantine Catholic Church in Cleveland.

Byzantine Catholic Community and is the officiant for its services in St. John Bosco Chapel on the campus of Wright State University. For all of the differences in rites, Sofia says the commonalities are much greater than what distinguishes the two ways of practicing faith.

"Everything that we do in the Byzantine church is based on the Roman Catholic Church. We are Catholic. We are united."



GIFTS OF APPRECIATED SECURITIES held for more than one year permit a donor to use the full value of the security at the time of donation as a tax deduction, while avoiding the capital gains tax that would be imposed if the security were sold.

BEQUESTS are excellent ways to participate in the campaign at levels you might not ordinarily consider. These include a bequest in one's will as well as various trust instruments. 

EARN A DOLLAR-FOR-DOLLAR TAX CREDIT ON OHIO INCOME TAXES WHEN YOU GIVE TO ARCHBISHOP CARROLL HIGH SCHOOL

The State of Ohio has passed a bill that allows a tax credit for qualified donations to a certified Scholarship Granting Organization (SGO). Ohio taxpayers who donate to SGOs may be able to claim a dollar-for-dollar, non-refundable tax credit on their Ohio income tax return for up to \$750 per donor or up to \$1,500 if married and filing jointly. You can still claim this credit for 2023 if you postmark/file your return by April 15, 2024.

How can I give to Carroll through this program?

Make your gift through the Archdiocese of Cincinnati's Catholic Education Foundation (CEF), a certified SGO with the State of Ohio. **Designate Archbishop Carroll High School** as your school of choice to ensure that your entire gift is directed to our school. You can make your gift online or through sending a check attached to a mail-in form.

How do I claim the credit on my tax return?

Shortly after your gift has been received and processed, the CEF-SGO will mail a gift acknowledgement letter to you. This letter can serve as documentation for a non-refundable Ohio income tax credit (up to \$750 per donor across all SGO donations for the tax year) when you prepare your Ohio income tax return.

What else should I know about this program?

Everyone's tax situation is different, and we encourage you to check with your tax preparation professional to determine if this is the best way for you to make a gift and help offset your state and federal tax liabilities. Contact Archbishop Carroll High School Director of Advancement Pete Williams '98 if you have questions about how donating to Carroll through the CEF-SGO will affect your current annual giving.

"Stand on the shoulders of giants" is a common phrase to anyone who is preparing to defend research or a thesis to earn an advanced degree. For Isaiah Taylor '14, that type of foundational support extends beyond his doctoral studies



and into the future of the next generation of learners from underrepresented backgrounds.

Taylor researches the effects of microgravity on bone cells, working towards a PhD in molecular and cellular pharmacology at Stony Brook University. In addition to the challenges of conducting advanced research and maintaining a work/life balance, Taylor is one of the leading voices for diversity and inclusion on campus. Stony Brook's most recent report says that approximately 12% of all of its students are African American, and Taylor says he is the only one in his PhD program.


As president of Stony Brook's Black Graduate Student Organization, Taylor leads the way in rebuilding the group's impact on campus as it relaunched this past fall after the COVID-19 pandemic derailed much of campus life. He also works part time for the DICE (Diversity, Intercultural and Community Engagement) Program in Stony Brook's Division of Student Affairs. According to their website, DICE's mission is to "provide programs to maintain an all-inclusive campus community where diversity is valued and celebrated, and where a positive campus climate is promoted. The office helps to foster a campus environment

that is welcoming, nurturing, and supportive for all members of the university." Taylor also served as peer mentor in the Office of Multicultural Affairs as an undergraduate at the University of Dayton.

Building relationships and providing an example for young learners of all races is of the utmost importance to Taylor after experiencing the impact a mentor can have.

"About two summers ago, I got to participate in this program called Scientists in Mentoring. It was a diverse and inclusive program, and I got a mentor from Johnson & Johnson who told me about her path. She helped me figure out where I want to go after graduation. That program helped me realize that no matter where I'm working, I still want to be involved in some sort of diversity and inclusion program. There should be more people of color in graduate school and professional school. It's very important for development starting from a young age. A lot of schools are predominately white institutions, so having representation is important because kids now and in college want to see an example. If there is no representation in these roles, maybe they get discouraged or have imposter syndrome. It's important for us growing up and even in college to see other people do it."

Providing opportunities to build a network of peers can lighten the burden of managing difficult classes, long days of experiments



and research in the labs, and the stresses of daily life. Taylor says his time playing sports and participating in clubs as a student at Carroll provided him a sense of belonging as a teenager and provided a sense of belonging in the community.

Taylor also carries the academic and spiritual foundations of a Carroll education with him to this day. He credits his difficult course load from high school with giving him an edge once he arrived in college. His faith is reflected in the work he does outside of the research labs to bring about positive change and a more just society. Ensuring that diversity and representation

are present in daily life are critical pillars of Catholic Social Teaching, and Taylor says that all institutions, including the church, must continue progressing with those values at the forefront of their missions.

After four years of rigorous academic work, an Archbishop Carroll High School Diploma represents mastery at the end of a student's high school career. For some students, achieving that diploma comes with additional challenges beyond the coursework itself. This is where the intervention specialists come in to assist students with diverse learning needs to make walking across the stage at graduation an achievable goal.

The four intervention specialists, lovingly referred to as the "MOD Squad" for the group's location in a modular building, each handle a caseload of 12-16 students who need assistance in various ways. Each of these students has an Individualized Education Plan (IEP), which is a legal document that affords students the opportunity to receive specially designed instruction. This is developed through collaboration with the students' parents/guardians, classroom teachers, related services, and the home school district. This document ensures the students receive the academic, emotional, and/or behavioral support they need to be successful.

With the help of scholarships such as the Jon Peterson Scholarship, intervention specialist Stephanie (Pugar) Sagasser '08 has seen programming and funding greatly increase in the private school system and at Carroll. "I grew up in Catholic schools, and intervention programs have grown so much since that time," she said. "It's great to see students who learn differently have an opportunity to have their needs met within a Catholic school setting."

Sagasser knew she always wanted to be a teacher, but it wasn't until her first placement as a University of Dayton student teacher that she realized that working with students with special needs was where she was called to serve. "I fell in love with it," she recalled.

Since that first placement, she has had an opportunity to work with students of varying ability in K-12th grade classroom settings. From students who need full individualized instruction to those who have met their goals and need minimal support, Sagasser has worked with

a wide variety of students, each with different, individual needs.

Along with Ben Swick, Allison Ford, and Emily Fogus, Carroll's other intervention specialists, Sagasser tackles busy days filled with different challenges and circumstances. They work with small groups of students in the modular unit that provides a safe space to care for students and further assist them with their studies. Not only is the team checking in with students on their caseload, but they are collaborating with the general education teachers in the building and working with them in many different ways. The IEP and 504 paperwork is created, reviewed, and documented by the four intervention specialists. Some students are in a general education classroom that is co-taught by a general education teacher and an intervention specialist in order to provide daily assistance in a mainstream classroom. Days are so busy that lunchtime is often used for department check-ins and teacher collaboration.


Like the general education teachers, the intervention specialists prepare their students for life after high school. The intervention team works to not only reinforce the students' curriculum and classroom lessons, but they also teach the students to advocate for themselves. "When students leave high school, they need to be able to advocate for what they need since an IEP does not follow them after they graduate," explains Mrs. Sagasser. In addition to selfadvocacy, the intervention specialists focus on teaching their students independent living skills including organization, time management, and personal finance, to name a few.

While some students will remain on an IEP for their entire high school career, many no longer are in need of their specially designed instruction, moments that the MOD Squad celebrates with the student and the team. At that final meeting, the student and his/her team looks

back on all of the progress from the student's academic career and celebrates how far that student has come to get to this point. Mrs. Sagasser shared how "intensely gratifying" that meeting is for all involved. "To be able to sit in a meeting and only focus on the positive is refreshing and rewarding."

The biggest reward for Sagasser has been to watch those students she has worked with for their entire high school career shake hands with Principal Matt Sableski '91 at graduation and receive their Archbishop Carroll High School diploma. "Some students have had a challenging road," she recalls, "It's academically difficult, and they made it."

Now, with a Carroll diploma in hand, students who once had to overcome various challenges are now making



a difference and finding success. Sagasser has former students keeping in touch and filling her in on all of their achievements as adults in the career world, and that is a motivation for Sagasser and the MOD Squad. "(They're) out in the world doing so well, and it's so good to see that."

















With the rise of hate rhetoric and division in the world, both students and teachers at Archbishop Carroll wanted to create a more positive, inclusive way to celebrate diversity and to engage in peaceful encounters with others- both at school and in the community. This led Carroll's Director of Community Engagement and Inclusion, Mrs. Tara Ashworth and fellow teachers Mr. Erik Ramsey '93 (Social Studies), and Mr. Ben Swick (Intervention Specialist) to create one of the newest club offerings, the Student Community Engagement Committee (SCEC).

The SCEC meets once a month during lunch and provides an opportunity for students to have small group discussions and "break bread together" by partaking in a culturally-responsive meal from various local, multicultural restaurants. Julia Dunlap '24 recognizes



the need to continue building an inclusive environment and gained new perspectives from just the few gatherings the committee has had so far. Dunlap recalled being surprised to find out that a fellow classmate did not like bread or potatoes — two things that are in Julia's usual cuisine — because they are not commonly eaten in Julia's friend's culture. "I want to learn new things about how I can be a better person in the world and how I can support my peers who are different from me," said Julia.

Dunlap and fellow committee members have had a chance to not only learn from their teachers and peers, but the SCEC invites guest speakers to discuss diversity in culture, religion, and diversity of ability, and other topics. So far, they have heard from Dr. Renate Frydman, a Holocaust survivor, and Beth Gaertner, with the Muscular Dystrophy Association.

Already, the students and teachers are producing tangible ways they can provide positive outreach to the entire student body in the near future, including a new social studies course offering for next year, created and



taught by Ramsey, that focuses on the diversity of the United States. "It is evident that our students are passionate about ensuring that everyone feels a safe sense of belonging and a purpose on our campus," said Ashworth.

While the committee is still in its infancy, Ashworth is already witnessing the fruits of the committee's gatherings thus far, saying, "These conversations and presentations have fostered impactful conversations among the young people in this building that will help unite our community and make a difference in our world."





ED CHOICE SCHOLARSHIPS NOW AVAILABLE TO ALL OHIO FAMILIES

Starting with the 2023-24 Academic Year, all students in the State of Ohio qualify for as much as \$8,407 per year in financial aid to attend Archbishop Carroll High School. Under the traditional scholarship program, families who reside in designated public school districts are eligible for the full amount of the scholarship. The expansion scholarship designates families whose household income is at or below 450% of the federal poverty line as eligible for the full amount of the scholarship. Families with a higher household income are eligible for a prorated amount of the scholarship.
