CARROLL LEGACY OF NATIONAL MERIT SCHOLARS GROWS

Aidan Fermier '25 has earned Commended Student status for his performance on the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, placing him among the top 50,000 students nationwide who took this test. Director of Academic Development Mrs. Jill Kilby presented Aidan with a certificate to honor his outstanding achievement.





OHIO ACADEMY OF SCIENCE HONORS CARROLL WITH TWO STEM AWARDS

Carroll's streak of winning the Governor's Thomas Edison Award for Excellence in STEM Education and Research has grown to 24 consecutive years, an accomplishment no other high school in Ohio can match. To earn this award, schools must hold a local science research day with at least 12 students. At least two of those students must go on to present research at a District Science Day or have six or more students participate in a District Science Day if no local science day took place. Students must also participate in a youth science activity outside of the classroom.

The Ohio Academy of Science (OAS) individually recognized Carroll teachers Alexis Barnhart, Amie Bailey, Cody Smith, Diane (McNelly) Keller '80, Liz Emser, Gretchen Obergefell '19, Laura Wright, Laurie Fuhr, Mary Ollier, Meghan Mulligan, Mike Lakin, and Todd Tayloe for mentoring students through classroom projects as part of the Edison Award program.

OAS also honored Carroll with the Harold C. Shaw Outstanding School Award for the fourth time in seven years. This prestigious award is based on student participation, attendance, and achievement at Ohio's State Science Day (SSD). 14 of the 17 Carroll students who presented research at SSD earned a Superior rating, and three earned an Excellent rating.



FREEDOM PLAYERS BRING HISTORY TO LIFE IN RADIUM GIRLS

This past fall, the Freedom Players performed the historical drama *Radium Girls* on the Carroll stage. The show is a drama based on the true story of female factory workers who painted dials on clocks in the U.S. Radium Plant. After having been instructed to perform such tasks, including refining paint brush points by putting the bristles in their mouths, the girls start to get very ill and eventually pass away. The play focuses on Grace, one of the workers who takes a stand against the factory and paves the way for others who continue to fight labor injustices in the workforce today.

"Taking a step back into the life of Grace Fryer gave me the chance to feel the pain of the working women as they fought to be seen," explained actress Tessa Zimmerman '25, "This was the first major part I had the honor of playing, and it was so challenging." Like her fellow cast and crew members, Tessa researched the characters, the historical events, and the path that radium has taken from being thought to cure cancer to our current understanding of this toxic element. Said Zimmerman, "This production was challenging for everyone involved. It is far more common for us to work with light or comedic works, but I believe that our cast was able to truly shine when they pivoted towards this tragedy."



MARCHING PATRIOTS SOAR TO NEW HEIGHTS WITH AWARD WINNING SHOW

The Marching Patriots filled the sky and stadiums with the music of songbirds with their 2024 competition show, *Birdland*. Another award-winning season culminated at the MSBA Championships with a third place finish in Class AAA as well as an award for Best Percussion. The band also participated in an exhibition performance at Ohio Stadium in Columbus for the first time in program history.

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Many years ago, the club PATS for Life was founded at Archbishop Carroll High School to advocate for human life. The club's most significant event was participating in the National March for Life in Washington, D.C. However, during the COVID-19 pandemic, the club dissolved. In the past two years, students have expressed a strong interest in reviving the club, leading to its reestablishment. This time, students emphasized the importance of addressing all aspects of human dignity, from conception to natural death. The foundation of this club is beautifully expressed in the words of Pope St. John Paul II: "Human persons are willed by God; they are imprinted with God's image. Their dignity does not come from

the work they do, but from the person they are."

The Church teaches that human dignity is not earned or granted but is inherent to every person as a creation in God's image. This dignity transcends differences in race, religion, talent, or place of birth. As Pope Francis reminds us, "The world exists for everyone, because all of us were born with the same dignity." PATS for Life has been enhanced and grown into Not By Chance. The group strives to put this belief into practice by fostering an environment of mutual respect, kindness, and inclusion in our school community.

Each month, the group hosts a meeting open to all students, not just club members. Each

meeting focuses on a different topic, such as the abolition of the death penalty, opposition to abortion, supporting victims of human trafficking, mental health awareness, spreading kindness, and many other pro-life themes. The club extends its mission beyond the school walls, having attended the Ohio March for Life in Columbus and the National March for Life in Washington, D.C. Additionally, students have participated in service projects with Dayton Right to Life, which works to protect and promote human life through law, education, and community action, and the SOAP Project, which aids victims of human trafficking.

Madeline Kramer '25, Hayden Hoefler '27, and Sarah Price '24 initiated the idea of restarting this group in 2023. Madeline humbly shares her experience.

"It has truly been a blessing to have the opportunity to work to advocate for the dignity of all life from conception to natural death in our school community, as well as on a state and national level. I have been inspired by the devotion some of my classmates show for the cause, pushing me to work harder to defend the dignity of all life. Teaching my classmates, community, and country about the importance of respecting all life has brought me so much joy. My favorite memory from this year has been attending the March for Life with some of my best friends. We felt like we were actually making a difference in the world, and we had an absolute blast along the way."

Hayden shares, "Not By Chance has played a tremendous role into my transition and settling at Carroll. My desire to fight for life and start this club got me more involved with Campus Ministry, helped me meet my favorite teachers ever, and also make the most loving friends. I have learned that through the smallest actions of love and my future vocation, I can love life and make a large difference in this world. Hook forward to continuing to serve Christ and to love his people from the womb to the tomb."

Faculty members Cassandra (Weitz) Shea '07, Emily Sreenan, and Liz Emser, with the support of the Director of Mission, Mrs. Martha Saurine, facilitate the Not




By Chance group. "It is incredible to witness the fire in the hearts of our students to share love and joy with those around them," Emser said. Unwaveringly, they defend the most vulnerable in our world, while also understanding how simple respecting life can be. While on the March for Life trip to Washington we had a chance to debrief the events of the march in small groups with the students. When asked how the students could put what they've learned during the trip into practice back in the school community, one student put it so well: 'It all starts with respecting and loving one

another through every encounter. It's really that simple.' It is evident that God is on the move in the hearts of these young adults!"

The Not By Chance group continues to grow in its mission, inspiring students to stand up for the dignity of all human life. Through their advocacy, service projects, and unwavering faith, they are making a meaningful impact in their school and beyond. With each step they take, they affirm the belief that every life is precious and worth protecting.

Not only has my time here at Carroll given me amazing friendships but also opportunities. We have so many clubs and sports that people can



Claire '25 and Bryce McEachen '25 have been at each other's side every step of the way as they've achieved excellence in academics, the arts, and athletics. The twins have also impacted their community through service as they pursued the rank of Eagle Scout with Scouting America.

Bryce's Eagle Scout two-part project focused on removing pollution in Greene County parks related to fishing. For the first part of the project, Bryce led an effort that resulted in the removal of 200 feet of tangled lines as well as bobbers, bait, and other items from trees and brush. He also created fishing line recapture containers and distributed them throughout parks in Beavercreek to lessen the impact of future waste.

Giving back to her parish community was foundational to Claire's project. She geolocated and documented

more than 2,000 gravestones in the St. Brigid cemetery, including people who fought in wars and lost their lives in the 1974 Xenia tornadoes.

Both projects were massive undertakings that involved both of the twins' scouting troops. They estimate that volunteers contributed more than 300 hours of work to both projects.

Involvement in scouting helped Claire and Bryce develop and execute their service projects while balancing their commitments at school.

In addition to schedules filled with Advanced Placement courses, Claire and Bryce both served as student leaders of the marching band, captains of the swim team, and members of National Honor Society and Spanish Honor Society.



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"We've gotten really good at time management," Claire said. "It's knowing what you're passionate about and choosing to make time for everything you're involved in"

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In its first year, the Student Community Engagement Committee (SCEC) focused on connecting Carroll students with the varying traditions and backgrounds of other families and cultures within the Patriot community. Guest speakers representing various backgrounds and cultures shared their experiences and challenged students to be in solidarity with groups with which they may not have had much experience previously. In year two, the group's sophomore year, the focus has been active communication and listening to create spaces for peaceful encounters and discussions.

The SCEC's founding faculty members, Tara Knopp (Director of Community Engagement & Inclusion and Spanish Teacher), Ramsey '93 (Director of Student Development), and Ben Swick (Intervention Specialist), were noticing that when their club members were gathering in the morning for donuts, students were organically discussing current events, world issues, and other high-stakes circumstances. Ms. Knopp was impressed to hear students discuss ways in which to navigate these topics with positive, productive rhetoric. She said that students were asking each other, "How can we be more positive about what is going on in the world?"

Their solution: finding ways to take the conversations and experiences from the club's discussions and to expand these conversations to the entire student body and the Dayton community. Said Knopp, "Listening and sharing has helped us see what our rights and responsibilities are as a team to foster a peaceful and inclusive environment on campus."

These conversations have greatly contributed to the success of The American Culture and Social Responsibility class now being offered in the Social Studies department. The class, being co-taught by Knopp, Ramsey, and Swick, focuses on introducing

students to the idea of what it means to be a citizen, civil rights, immigration, and how to navigate responsible citizenship through the lens of Catholic Social Teaching.

The students in the course, many of whom are in the SCEC, have felt called to take what they have learned and share it with the Carroll student body. After students had written proposals on how to make the school more inclusive for disabled students, for example, the students mingled at lunch to ask questions that fostered intentional, positive,

schoolwide conversation. "You could feel the school's unity that day," recalls Knopp, "We look forward to more studentled engagement activities in the upcoming semester."

One of those engagement activities includes a trip to the Dayton Peace Museum, where SCEC students will meet with Dayton City Commissioner Matt Joseph '90, Welcome Dayton, and other high school students in the Dayton area. Their mission is to use that time to discuss how to foster a peaceful environment with their peers throughout

Dayton. They also hope to plan collaborative service opportunities to further connect local teens with each other and the Dayton community.

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"Moments when we help lead students to their call to serve their community...brings me great joy as an educator." For Knopp and her fellow SCEC faculty team, they are looking forward to seeing the students implement their plans to positively impact the Carroll community and beyond.





ACT I: AN EDUCATION IN MIND, BODY, AND SPIRIT

Every freshman begins their high school career with an opportunity to set a new road forward for themself. Tom Clark '65 discovered a path that split in different directions but always seemed to loop back around to Archbishop Carroll High School.

As part of Carroll's first graduating class, Clark and his classmates found themselves in a unique position. "We were always at the top of the heap, so to speak," Clark recalled. He took advantage of the many opportunities in front of him to develop as an athlete on the football field and as an actor on the stage. A booming voice and commanding stage presence earned Tom the lead role of Jesse

Stewart in Carroll's first senior play, *The Thread That Runs So True*. After graduating from Carroll, Tom continued to grow these talents at the University of Dayton.

Tom's time as a Flyer closely matched his days as a Patriot, with many hours spent balancing his time on field, auditioning for roles in UD theater productions, earning a double major, and working a part time job. Those college experiences prepared him for the first step in his career back on Linden Avenue.


ACT II: HOMECOMING

A new wave of faculty at Carroll accompanied a new decade on the calendar at the start of the 1970s. Many of Carroll's teachers left to carry out other assignments and mission work

as assigned by their religious orders, and Principal Fr. Stanley Neiheisel needed to hire the next wave of talented educators. After teaching English to freshmen in his first year, Tom knew he wanted to return to Carroll's theater program. Mrs. Maxine Stucke gave Tom her seat in the Director's Chair at the start of his second year of teaching at Carroll. Tom led two stage productions a year from 1970-1972 in addition to teaching courses in Theater Arts and Filmmaking and Appreciation.

ACT III: TAKING THE SHOW ON THE ROAD

After a four year run at Carroll, Tom was recruited by Wright State University to expand their course offerings in film. One year of full time teaching film at



the undergraduate level inspired Tom to grow his knowledge at Ohio University. Three years in Athens as a graduate student, undergraduate instructor, and library assistant cemented his passion for visual and performing arts education. Another run at Wright State opened the door to become a theater instructor at Beavercreek High School, where Tom would oversee two decades of productions. The curtain rose on Tom's second stretch of teaching Latin and English at Carroll from 2001 until 2012. Tom also founded the Latin program at Incarnation Catholic School in Centerville, his final full time role in education.

ACT IV: SHINING A LIGHT ON ARTS EDUCATION

The common thread of Tom's career in education was his love for performance. His involvement in Muse Machine, a K-12 arts education program, allowed Tom to share his passion for the stage and screen with tens of thousands of students throughout southwest Ohio and Kentucky. Tom's time with Muse Machine started during the organization's early years in the 1980s as a school liaison, arranging for students

to attend live performances in professional venues like the Victoria Theatre in Downtown Dayton as well as smaller shows that could be performed at school buildings. Retirement from teaching provided Tom with the time needed to focus on recruitment and retention for member schools involved with Muse Machine.

ACT V: AN AWARD WINNING PERFORMANCE

This year, Muse Machine dedicated their annual high school production to Tom in recognition of the countless hours he has spent promoting performing arts to students



throughout the Dayton region over his career.

"From the very beginning of Muse Machine, Tom Clark has been a dynamic teacher, a creative resource for other educators and an enthusiastic volunteer and supporter," Muse Machine said in a statement on its website. "His steadfast commitment has played a crucial role in advancing Muse's mission and inspiring countless young lives through the arts."

STEVE POPP Class of 1974


Steve is a local soccer coaching legend. He won the large school national coach of the year from the


Dr. Abell earned a BS in Mechanical Engineering in 1985, and a MS/PhD in


