

ACADEMICS

Aquaponics brings lessons to life

A year-long experiment in maintaining an ecosystem demonstrated just how fragile interconnected life forms are to Tom Westgerdes '22 and the rest of the students studying Ecology.

After using an aquaponics system to grow plants in the fall, the students added dozens of perch, one of Ohio's most common fish, to the environment to see how they would co-exist with the plants.

"I learned just how delicate the balance of life is in the wild," Westgerdes said. "Every day, our class had duties such as measuring the pH, calcium, and iron levels within the system. This was to ensure that the fish would survive and in turn nurture the plant life in the system. Even with this extreme care, many of the fish died."



After restocking the fish tank and adjusting their approach with feeding and water conditions, the students were able to care for the fish and watch them grow over the final weeks of the

semester. The semester culminated with a successful harvest of many fish that could be used to prepare meals along with the produce fed through the aquaponics system.

Patriots take the lead at Ohio Youth-in-Government

Two Patriots encourage others to take their Chance at TEDxYouth

Empowered and confident are how Mikayla Petrovic '22 and Jakob Burdick '22 described their mindsets after delivering speeches at the 2022 TEDxYouth Dayton event in March. They hope to pass those feelings on to their peers through the stories they shared.

"It helped me realize that my voice does matter, and I can make a difference," Petrovic said. "I've always wanted to do something to help, but I never knew how to. Even if one person listens and takes the message away from our speeches, we made an impact."

As two of eleven speakers selected to deliver a talk focused on the theme *chance*, Mikayla and Jakob worked from December through March brainstorming, researching, writing, revising, and memorizing their speeches. Jakob encouraged young voters to take advantage of their chance to change their communities at the ballot box, and Mikayla examined the advantages she grew up with and how to use them to benefit those around her.

They both recall pacing through the backstage area at the Main Branch of





the Dayton Metro Library moments before delivering their speeches.

Seeing rows of their family members, classmates, and teachers helped calm their nerves.

"I'd love to run for Congress one day," Jakob said. "It felt like it was my first campaign speech, so coming off the stage, doing it well, and getting the audience to react the way they did, it was a good confidence booster."

Marching Patriots *Closing In* on another outstanding season

The Archbishop Carroll High School Marching Patriots will present their 2022 competition show *Closing In* at numerous performance venues this fall.

The show features original music by director of bands, Carl Soucek, and



visual design by drill writer, Thomas Sparling. Melodies from artist Imogen Heap's song, *Closing In*, build the musical foundation of the performance, and the band and guard will be staged in a set of props that physically close in on the performers as the show progresses.

Under the direction of Mr. Carl Soucek and Mr. Aaron West '07, the 80 member group of musicians and guard members will compete locally and regionally, including a September 17 performance at the Bands of America Obetz Regional in southern Ohio and the 2022 Bands of America Grand National Championships at Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis on November 11.

Drum Majors Mason LaJeunesse '23 and Cecilia Sharp '23 will also lead the band in regular season football games and local competitions in the Mid-States Band Association. The staff and students are thrilled to continue their legacy of perennial finals appearances and medal winning performances at Mid-States Band Association circuit championships throughout the fall.

Carroll artist earns national prestige for oil painting

During her sophomore year Emma Williams '23 began experimenting with oil painting. Little did she know that her first piece, *The Freedom of Being Young*, would take her to New York City this past June to receive the National Gold Medal at the Scholastic Art Awards. She now joins artists and creatives such as Ezra Jack Keats and Andy Warhol as award winners when they were emerging artists.

The piece is inspired by a photograph Emma took of her sister, Maggie Williams '25, and their 10 year-old cousin playing in a flower field at a family gathering in Columbus. *The Freedom of Being Young* was selected from hundreds of pieces to be displayed at the Regional Art Exhibit at the K12 Gallery in Dayton. From there, it received a Gold Key and moved on to the National Adjudication, where it received the rare, prestigious Gold Medal. The piece was also displayed digitally with other Scholastic Art Award recipients in an exhibit coinciding with the ceremony.

Williams comes from a family of artists, as both her mother, Katie (Landis) Williams '92, and grandmother both specialized in watercolor painting. Emma took her entire family, along with Mrs. Merland, to New York City this past June to formally receive the award at Carnegie Hall.

Though Emma grew up in an artistic household, her first formal art lesson took place in Renee Merland's classes at Carroll. Emma is Carroll's first National Gold Medal recipient. "It

is so cool to see someone so humble about her talent taking a step and letting her talents shine," said Merland, "She's getting the recognition she deserves, and I'm just really happy and proud that she's doing that for herself."

Freedom Players *Journey to the Past* for spring musical

The Freedom Players presented Anastasia for their spring production. The 2017 musical, based on the 1997 animated film, dives into the legend surrounding Anastasia Romanov, the youngest daughter of the last Tsar of Russia. The story stars a young woman, Anya (Isabella Olivas '23), who is searching for her past and the family she has never known. With the help of two con men, Dimitri (Max Weitz '22) and Vlad (Brian Crum '23), Anya travels from St. Petersburg to Paris to discover her family, her true love, and, ultimately, herself.

Though the piece is considered historical fiction, director Toni (Hemmert) Weitz '86, and music director Rachel (Niemer) Barnell '06 could not help but notice the deep connection to current global events. "Anastasia's desires are simple: to find true love that comes from being with her family," said Weitz. "Her journey from Russia to France, though a fictitious one, is one that audience members will relate to, as so many have desired to reconnect with family members distanced due to the pandemic. Watching characters onstage who are reluctantly fleeing the homeland they love for safety will resonate with audience members who have watched the conflict in Ukraine with heavy hearts. Our show reveals the hope and love that awaits at the end of the journey."

Anastasia won 12 Miami Valley High School Theatre Awards (MVHSTA), including Outstanding Lead Actress in a Musical for Olivas' performance as Anya/Princess Anastasia. She also performed a piece from the show at the MVHSTA Showcase on the Schuster



Center stage. The Freedom Players also won 20 MVHSTA awards for their fall production of *Daddy's Girl* including Merit for Production of a Play.

Dallas TEAMS students shine

The Patriots' road to the Technology Student Association's Test of Engineering Aptitude, Mathematics, and Science (TEAMS) competition began this past winter when the group was tasked with retrofitting a minor league baseball stadium to host a concert while enhancing the fan experience, ensuring safety, maximizing the flow of fans, and featuring the stadium as a model that others should follow. Dayton Dragon's Executive Vice President Eric Deutsch spoke to the students about how Day Air Ball Park has been transformed into a concert venue in the past to show them best practices for their problem solving.

Two Carroll teams qualified to compete in Dallas for national awards in the 2022 competition, and the team of Vivian Dao '22, Max Weitz '22, Christine Zhou '22, and Andrea Olivas '22, a substitute participant for Vincent Ye '22, earned a spotlight on the awards stage twice for top ten finishes in the Multiple Choice and Presentation portions of the competition.

After winning "Best in State" awards at a multifaceted STEM competition in Dallas in the spring, four Archbishop Carroll High School students earned top ten awards in multiple categories at the national event.

01 Why make a gift?

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

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STUDENT REFLECTION | BREA LAWTON '22



Walking through the front doors of Carroll High School as a freshman, I was expecting to get an extensive education and make some memories. I was not, however, expecting to learn an incredibly valuable lesson about life: it's okay to walk your own path. And I learned this, again and again, each year through Carroll's retreats. Growing up, I was raised Catholic, but my family didn't live it out until I went to my first Catholic school in fifth grade. Even then, it was more so for the community and less for the religion. So, as an effect, I didn't truly know God until I came to Carroll and started going on retreats.

The retreat freshman year was my least favorite. This isn't to say it was unenjoyable, I just can't even remember what happened on it. I do know every person there was obsessed with their image and how others viewed them, including me. This retreat was mostly full of ice breakers because none of us really knew each other yet. Sophomore retreat was better, but still not great. Although this may be alarming, the part where Señora Branum made every girl cry was my favorite. Her message was beautiful and positive to its core. She told me at this retreat that she knew I would make a great leader one day, and I believed her. Junior retreat was the first one we went on after COVID hit. It was a full-day retreat, and I remember genuinely enjoying it, but I don't think I truly experienced what was expected of me. And, finally, we have Senior year retreat, the last one most of us ever get the chance to go on. I enjoyed this retreat so

much that I went on it twice; once to experience it and again to lead it, just as Señora Branum had predicted. The impact PATS Retreat has on you cannot be understated. a disciple's **JOURNEY**

How a search for home led Fr. Sean Stilson 'o6 across America to discover his vocation

As the child of United States Air Force Master Sergeant Gregroy Stilson and First Lieutenant Mona Stilson, Sean spent the first fourteen years of his life growing up in six different states. Frequent moves prevented the Stilson family from calling one place home for more than a handful of years at a time, but the time they spent together practicing their Catholic faith provided a foundation for the rest of Sean's life.

"It was a source of consistency because no matter where you move in the world, the Catholic Church is the Catholic Church," Stilson says. "The Mass is the Mass. We always practiced our faith no matter where we were."

Attending Mass every Sunday, frequent prayer, and reading the Bible with his family are some of Sean's earliest memories. Despite constantly moving, he always felt the presence of God nearby instead of as a vague entity across an unreachable distance.

His parents received relocation orders

for an assignment at Wright Patterson Air Force Base the summer before Sean would begin high school, and the Stilsons settled in Dayton. Sean and his family became regular parishoners at Immaculate Conception Church where he would sing in the choir and play in the band for rock mass on Sunday evenings. A few months later, the next chapter of Sean's faith journey began when he became a freshman at Archbishop Carroll High School in the summer of 2002.

Sean fondly recalls competing as a member of the Cross Country team and playing trumpet in the Symphonic Band, but faith formation inside and out of the classroom made the biggest impact on him during his time as a student. Religion classes that focused on the Old Testament and New Testament that explored scripture provided him with a deeper understanding of Christ's teachings, and courses like Peace and Justice as well as Media, Teens, and Values applied those lessons to modern society. Participating in Christian Service Workcamp prior to his senior year helped open Sean's eyes to see things from the perspectives of people who are struggling to meet their basic needs and realize what God calls us to do about those things.

Seventeen years after that life-changing experience, Fr. Sean Stilson celebrated Mass with another group of Carroll Patriots during their workcamp week in the church where he worshiped and sang countless times before with students who would soon live the same workcamp experience.

The path to that moment was not always clear.

"Our faith calls us to our God, calls us to go outside of our comfort zone. That's not only what workcamp is about. The whole education at Carroll is meant to lead the students to not simply live a life of doing what feels good in the moment, but to reflect on deeper values and how God calls us to live our lives to their highest potential, make a difference in the world, and help others."



PRIESTLY ORDINATION OF FR. SEAN STILSON ST. ROSE OF LIMA CHURCH JUNE 2, 2018

Sean was open to the possibility that answering God's call could mean entering the priesthood even as a Carroll student, but he was not certain about that decision when he graduated in 2006. He knew he wanted to be close to God and serve him in some way, so he attended St. Mary's University in San Antonio, a Catholic, Marianist University, to study theology. The coursework held his interest and inspired him to continue learning more about his faith, but Sean did not envision a future teaching theology and hadn't yet decided to become a priest when he completed his degree in May 2010. A conversation with his girlfriend at the time inspired him to consider the call to religious life more intently.

After months of prayer and conversations with a priest for guidance, Sean heard God's call becoming clear. He remembers going to Mass and being fascinated that a human could act on God's behalf to bless those around him and forgive sins. He wanted to help others in the same way that he had been helped throughout his life by priests, and the growing desire to do so outweighed his wishes to have a family of his own.

Going to class and studying were just a small part of Sean's Masters of Divinity program at the Oblate School of Theology in San Antonio, a seminary run by the Oblates of Mary Immaculate. Celebrating Mass, praying, participating in the Liturgy of the Hours, and receiving spiritual direction filled most of his days as a seminarian. Sean also had to pass a psychological evaluation to ensure that he was prepared to devote the rest of his life to his faith and other people in such a profound way. Each of his four years in the seminary focused on a different aspect of service and outreach as part of his Theological Field Education. One year, he regularly visited people in hospice care preparing for the end of life. He also guided adults embarking on a new faith journey of their own as a parish director for the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults, visited inmates in a county jail, served as a hospital chaplain, and even spent a summer in Mexico to learn Spanish so that he could meet the needs of all the members of his San Antonio community.

Sean's ordination ceremony came in 2018 after spending the final months of his time in the seminary as a deacon interning at a nearby parish to gain practical, administrative knowledge of how to run church.

"Part of me was relieved that all the seminary formation was completed. It was certainly a joyful occasion to finalize in a public way my commitment to God. It was an experience of finality that I was no longer discerning what God wanted me to do with my life, but that I had finally found it and committed to it."

In addition to serving St. Philip of Jesus Catholic Church in San Antonio as pastor, Sean remains an active member of his religious community where he manages finances as treasurer, plans retreats as worship director, and helps young people discern their call as a vocation director. As a newer priest, Sean tries to deliver a message that resonates with young men and women looking for answers to the same questions he once had.

"One of the messages I try to convey to any person is that God has a plan for your life. He created you for a reason, gave you particular gifts and interests, and wants you to use those gifts and pursue those interests. The life God calls us to is the best life we can live. He doesn't call us to be miserable or ruin our fun. He guides us in life because he wants to guide us to a beautiful future."

The search for a beautiful future led Sean back to the place he knew best.

"I grew up as a military brat, really as a nomad. We don't have a physical home and move every few years, so it can be a very really rootless lifestyle. It was difficult

for me at first to contemplate committing my whole life to being a member of the same community or serving in the same diocese as a priest, but I think we all need to set down roots somewhere. It was a good experience for me to stop being a nomad and settle down somewhere."

LEGACY FAMILY | SABLESKI

On May 20, 2022, three Sableski family members appeared on stage at Archbishop Carroll High School's graduation ceremony —and one is both the principal and an alumnus. Matt Sableski '91 handed out diplomas to and hugged his twins, Patrick and Annie. Sableski and his wife, Mary-Kate, also have daughters Nora '24 and Colleen '27, a seventh grader at St. Helen School in Riverside and future Patriot.



"I feel truly blessed to work at the place my kids go to school," Sableski said. "I have loved watching them grow and learn and interact with their classmates each day. By and large my kids do well academically, make good choices and they have wonderful groups of friends. We set boundaries and I give them their space, but the best part of any day is when I see them during the day, even if they're coming to ask for money or an item left at home!"

Having your dad just down the hall in the main office every school day could be intimidating for any teenager, but Annie and Patrick eventually embraced it and the extraordinary richness it brought to their high school career.

"[Having my dad as principal] shaped my formation by giving me a chance to experience high school in a special way that others didn't get to experience," said Annie. "Getting into the building after hours, talking with my dad about concerns my friends and I had and seeing how much the school meant to my family were all ways that my experience was unique." "Going into and throughout the first year or two of high school, I was definitely worried about becoming my own person and not being identified only as the principal's son," said Patrick. "Just like any high schooler, I have really come into my own the last couple of years. My dad is obviously a huge part of my life, but I have become my own person, and I feel now as if I am viewed that way rather than as an extension of my father."

Sableski admitted that his own freshman year at Carroll was much like his son's: a lesson in discovery.

"When I came in as a freshman, I was 4'11" and weighed about 90 pounds," said Sableski. "I was kind of lost that first year, but once I started running cross country and track as a sophomore, everything changed. I became more confident, started to succeed academically, and made great friends."

Like his father, Patrick ran cross country and track and was captain for both teams. He's been involved in numerous service activity clubs, including Youth in Government and Trinity House Captain, while Annie was busy with theater, campus ministry, cooking club and Trinity House, where she was service coordinator.

Despite all the advantages of having your parent on campus with you, both teens admit to being aware of his presence when in the presence of others.

"Especially early on, I felt as if some of my peers worried about me being the principal's kid when interacting with me, not talking to me much," said Patrick. "Some teachers, too, would seem to sort of walk on eggshells around me. Overall, however, my experience at Carroll with my dad and sisters has been a very positive one."

"The funniest moment with my dad was when a teacher made a joke about my dad and the teacher quickly realized that I was in the room and got embarrassed," Annie said. "I thought it was funny and laughed right along with everyone else."

There were also many special moments, such as when Sableski presented to each child an award for academic achievement and when he addressed the student body at school Masses.

"Mass is very important for us at Carroll, so it is very cool to see everyone in a good mood with my dad addressing all of us," said Patrick. "I felt how special this was and appreciated it a little extra this year as we weren't able to have any all-school Masses last school year due to the pandemic."

After graduation, Annie plans to attend St. Mary's College (Ind.) then become a kindergarten teacher in Catholic education, crediting her father with inspiring her to work with students. Patrick plans to attend The University of Dayton, major in English, and eventually become a filmmaker. Both take with them a strength in both character and faith, thanks to the example set by their father.

"I have seen how hard [my dad] works every day and how he cares so much, especially these last few years," said Patrick. "Watching him work through a pandemic has shown me just how much this job means to him."

Annie added, "My dad is a great role model who has a very strong faith and has inspired in me a strong work ethic, a love of my family, and a love of God."


