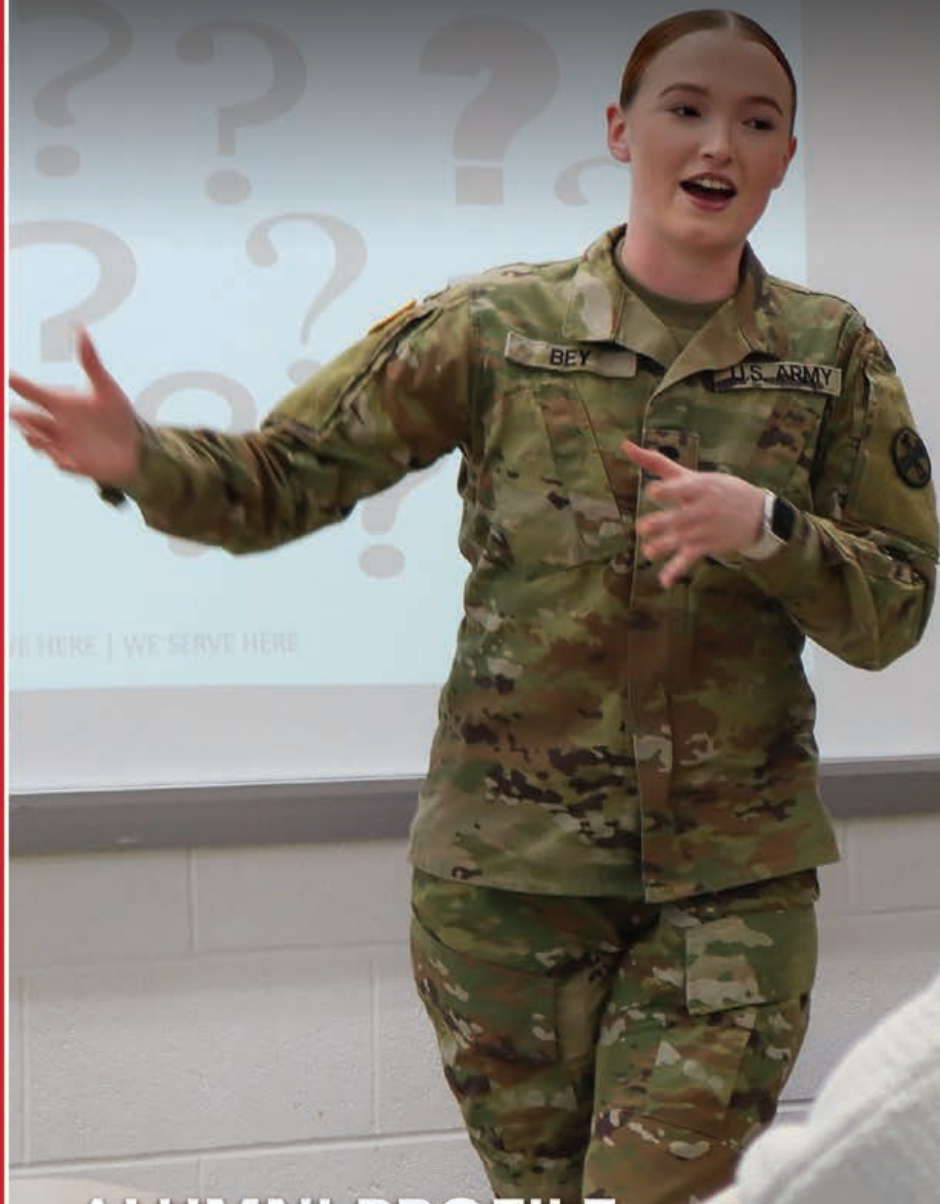

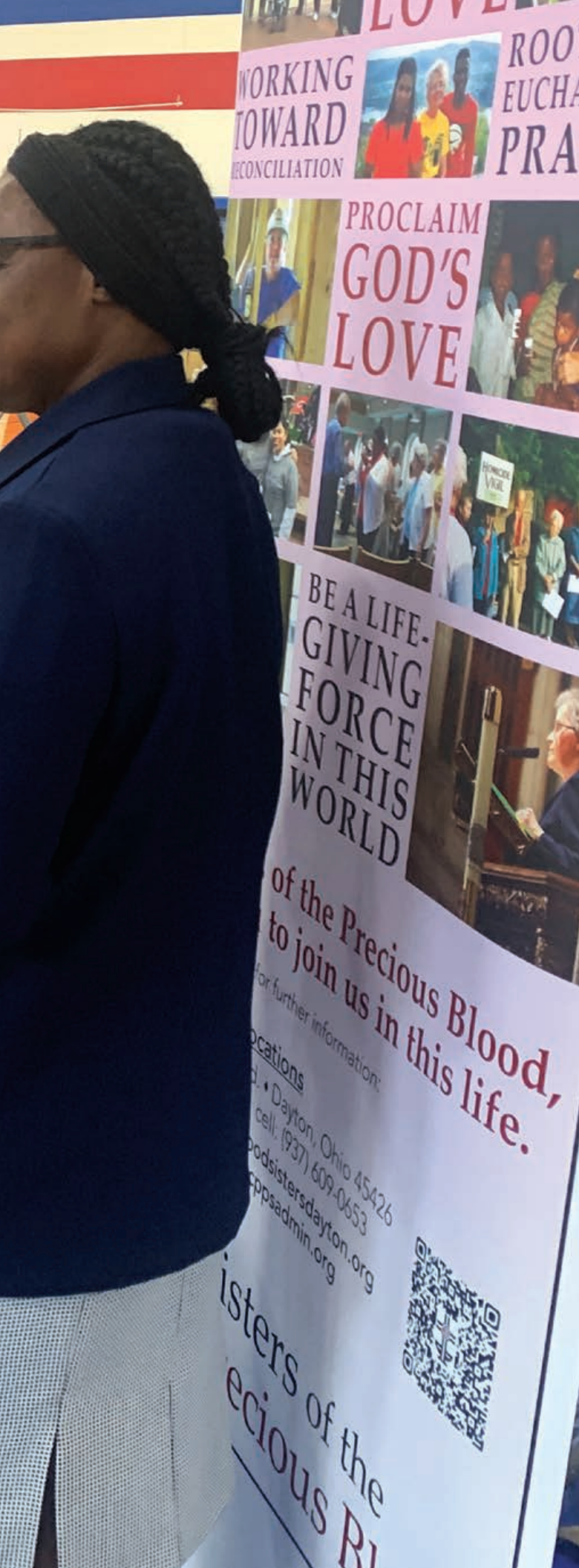

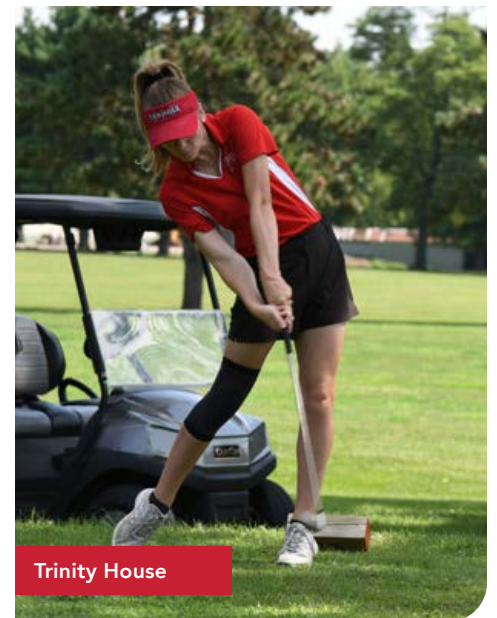
Trinity House

A look at some of the highlights from within and around our amazing student community

ACADEMICS

Crafting Carroll history into a new creation

What started as a way to cut costs on a woodworking project grew into several students breathing new life into a piece of school history. Modern bleachers replaced the old, wooden bleachers that had been part of the stage in the gymnasium for decades as part of a facility renovation during the summer of 2022. Instead of adding waste to a landfill, students in woodworking classes upcycled the scrap lumber.

Mason LaJeunesse '23 and the other students in Woods III typically design their own projects, but Mason found blueprints online for chairs that could utilize the old bleachers. The plans guided the students to transform the old bleachers into a new form of seating, individual chairs.

“It’s a cool way to look at it,” LaJeunesse said. “You’re taking a big piece of school history and giving it the same function, just in an updated form. At first, it was all about saving money because the woodworking projects aren’t cheap. The wood being part of school history added to the cool factor of the project.”

Since 2016, science teacher Todd Tayloe has experimented with various projects that expose his students to often-overlooked STEM-related career paths, such as those in agricultural sciences.

After attending various workshops with GrowNextGen, an educational program funded by the Ohio Soybean Council and Ohio soybean farmers, Mr. Tayloe realized that there are many jobs available in Ohio that directly relate to the agricultural sciences about which he could teach his students. “I was trying to spark their interest in these jobs not being filled in Ohio,” explained Tayloe.

By securing grant funding, Mr. Tayloe was able to set up a lettuce-producing aquaponics station in his classroom for his ecology and zoology classes. Aquaponics, the combination of aquaculture (fish-farming) and hydroponics (growing plants in water rather than soil), mimics a natural

ecosystem that his students could both study and participate in.

When the school’s salad bar first reopened this year after the coronavirus-related shutdown, Tayloe saw an opportunity for his students’ lettuce harvest to supply nutritious meals in the Carroll lunchroom at the start of the 2022-23 academic year.

Since then, the aquaponics projects have yielded the equivalent of three heads of lettuce almost daily to be added to the salad bar. Mr. Tayloe plans on expanding his students’ lettuce production by adding his hydroponics system to the project. By doing this, Tayloe theorized that his students “could provide all the lettuce each day for the cafeteria” while also inspiring the Carroll student body to take an interest in where their own healthy food comes from.

Ten seniors earn National Merit Scholarship spotlight

The College Board is honoring ten members of the Archbishop Carroll High School Class of 2023 for their performance on the PSAT during their junior year of high school.

Meredith Sanders is one of approximately 15,000 students in America that has qualified as Finalist for her performance on the 2022 NMSQT/PSAT. The College Board will announce National Merit Scholarship Finalists in February 2023. Dylan King, Jack Agnew, Luke Herrmann, Seth Tivakaran, and Nathan Snizik earned Commended Scholar status. Approximately 34,000 members of the Class of 2023 earned this award nationally.

Sydney Ramsey, Tammi James, Mia Harrison, and Cody Bryant were chosen by the College Board for National Recognition Programs. These National Recognition Programs grant underrepresented students with academic honors that can be included on college and scholarship applications and connect students with universities across the country, helping them meaningfully stand out during the admissions process.

What follows is a classic Christie puzzle of mixed motives, concealed identities, a second death and both a determined inspector (Brian Crum ‘23) and novice detective Miss Marple (Lily Wittman ‘24) following the case’s twists, turns, and dramatic final confrontation.

Directed by Toni (Hemmert) Weitz ‘86 and Student Director Isabella Olivas ‘23, the production featured 58 students in the cast and crew, as

"A lot of times when you hear about vocations, we're told, 'You can be a priest, a nun, or you can be single,' and you don't expand on what those entail," Hope Danis '25 said.

Hope and her classmates learned more about how others are living out their callings. Danis enjoyed meeting members of Cookies for Kairos, an organization that evangelizes through

When beloved teacher Mrs. Marcy (Hemmert) Hughes '83 was diagnosed with breast cancer for a second time, her senior students knew that they wanted to do something to show their support. So Julia Roberts '23 and her Flag Patrol peers came up with a fundraiser to give back in Hughes' name.

The students sold purple bracelets inscribed with "Nobody Stands Alone" and "Cancer Awareness" at a football game and for two weeks during lunch, with 100% of the proceeds going to the Pink Ribbon Girls, an organization dedicated to serving breast/

gynecological cancer patients and their families.

Roberts and fellow classmate Sydney Hudson '23 visited the Pink Ribbon Girls to share their donation and tour the facilities. "It was very uplifting," recalls Roberts.

Like the Pink Ribbon Girls facilities, Roberts and her peers were proud to provide some support to fellow Patriots navigating a cancer diagnosis. "I just wanted to let Mrs. Hughes and everyone in the Carroll community who has faced all kinds of cancer that, no matter what, we always have their back."

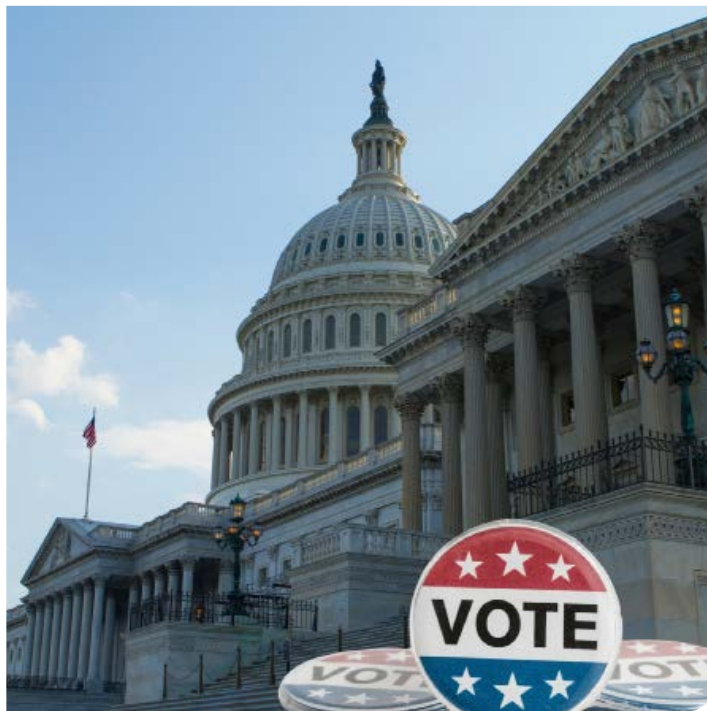

The following year, my junior year, I took AP Government with Mr. [Chris] Sorrell '83. I could go on and on about the great things this class and this teacher did for me as a student, voter, and a person, but in short it helped me to apply what I had learned the year before. I learned the processes of our government, and exactly the means through which I was able to express my newly formed perspectives. I also understood the ways other people have been expressing their own perspectives and how I can join them. By the time I had completed the AP test, I felt I was ready to go to the polls and make an informed, positive impact.

After I voted for the first time, I was thrilled to finally be able to participate in something I have become so invested in. I felt that while it was one measly vote, it was an informed, educated, and passionate one. I was now a part of how our government works. The next day I went to tell Mr. Sorrell that I had voted, and he said something along the lines of, "And you'll keep coming back."

He's right.

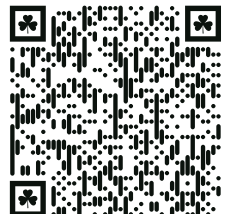

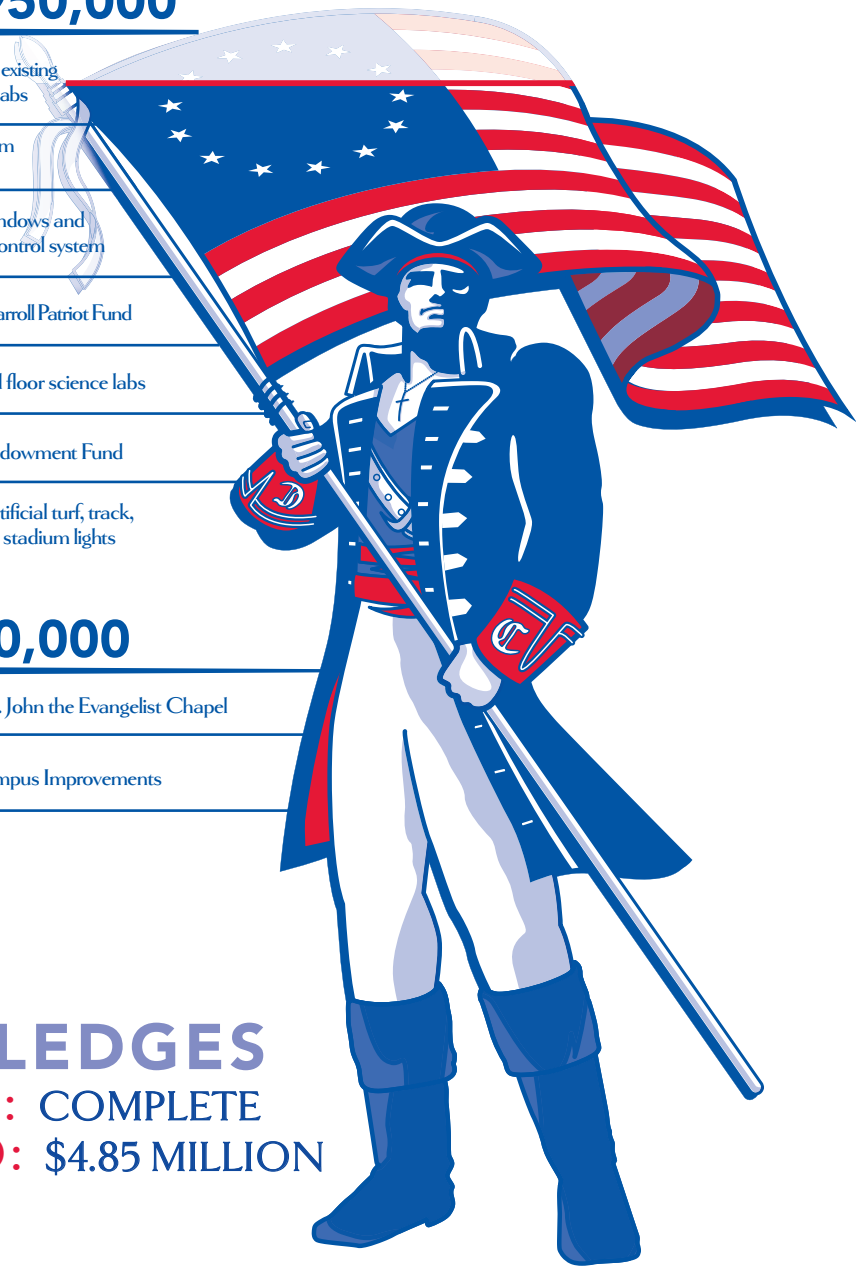

01 Why make a gift?

Helping guide the State of Ohio's economic development policies and long-term plans is based on a heritage of service for JP Nauseef '84. The son of a United States Air Force general who served at Wright Patterson Air Force Base, Nauseef followed in his father's footsteps and was commissioned into the service after graduating from the University of Dayton.

His most profound and lasting legacy at the Dayton region's largest single-site employer would come decades later when the US Department of Defense initiated another Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) process that threatened to eliminate thousands of jobs in 2005. In the years since



the conclusion of that round of base closures and shifting of resources, the number of employees inside the fence at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base grew from 19,000 to 33,000. An estimated 27,000 additional permanent jobs for contractors, suppliers, and infrastructure to support the base and its operation nearly double the number of people employed locally thanks in large part to the leadership of Nauseef and his team.

Nauseef is continuing that work as the president of JobsOhio, the state's private non-profit economic development agency. He manages a team of 100 people and six regional partners across the state that look for opportunities to create new jobs and protect the ones that already exist in ten major sectors of industry and commerce. Much like the efforts to build a secure foundation for Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Nauseef's team is focused on making Ohio a place where major organizations want to do business.

Taking advantage of JobsOhio's capabilities and a talented team, Nauseef led the efforts to land Intel's \$20 billion capital investment to build semiconductors to power the next generation of manufacturing in the Buckeye State. The impact of the September 2022 groundbreaking ceremony in Licking County could reach up to \$100 billion and is expected to reverberate throughout Ohio, including in Dayton where several Intel suppliers are already doing business. Nauseef says this project, along with recent investments by Honda, Abbott, and Ford signal a massive on-shoring and re-shoring of high-paying jobs. Nauseef credits the

lessons he learned in his past to help create a bright future for the people of Ohio.

"The experiences and lessons I learned in Dayton and at Archbishop Carroll High School have positively impacted my entire life," Nauseef said. "Like a lot of Air Force dependents and kids,



you don't know a soul when you get to a new home. They embraced my family and me. That was my first exposure to what I consider my home. Carroll is an elite learning institution to prepare you for the next chapter of your life. I am proud to be a Patriot, and I am confident the current students there are as well. The lessons I learned at Archbishop Carroll High School to work hard and welcome others have been essential in forming who I am."

PINNING DOWN CHANGE

How a Carroll freshman and a new varsity sport are helping change the landscape of girls' sports nationwide

Like many other young girls, June Pyles Tresser '26 grew up trying every sport she could. Unlike many other young girls, wrestling is the one she fell in love and stuck with as she grew. Living in a household with parents who both wrestle helped make the sport feel comfortable and familiar, but at every tournament, June felt out of place compared to her competition. That's why she traveled to our nation's capital this past fall to advocate for change with federal lawmakers.

Along with her mother and coach of Carroll's new girls' wrestling program, Brittany Carrington, June represented Ohio at Girls High School Wrestling Advocacy Day on September 21, 2022. Wrestle Like a Girl, a nationwide girls' wrestling advocacy group, organized the event that included a breakfast meeting at the Rayburn House Office Building and a full day of meetings with congressional representatives from states where girls' wrestling is not a sanctioned sport.

As the only girl from a state where girls' wrestling is recognized as an official sport, June felt honored to share her story with girls like her who were fighting for change.

"I want them to know about the equality it would create within sports. The women in wrestling have always been stuck in with the boys, so it would create a new family in the sport," Tresser said. "I talked to them about how I was interested to hear about the growth of wrestling in their state and how it compares to Ohio. It was interesting to hear the statistics about how the sport is growing."

June hopes that sharing her experience in state where girls' wrestling is on more equal ground with boys' programs will inspire more participation and more opportunities for girls like her.

"I was always kind of an outcast when I was on boys' teams. This feels a lot more like a family. It's cool to see all the girls at tournaments and all the



other schools that also have new girls' teams. After taking so long, it's finally happening. There's finally a change and finally a movement for it. I'm starting high school being able to participate in a sanctioned sport with a team. The family, the people, the girls who are involved in women's wrestling – they're the greatest sisterhood you could ever get."

Mia Harrison '23 has her sights set on working in the US State Department using diplomacy to change the world. This year, she revived a new club at Archbishop Carroll High School to help her make that dream come true.

Starting a new chapter of the Model United Nations at Carroll was a project she began as a freshman but had to put on hold as the Covid-19 pandemic changed everything about how schools and group events like the Model UN summit operated in Ohio and around the world. Now as a senior, Mia was able to bring that group to life at Carroll with the help of Social Studies teacher Mrs. Courtney (Griffith) Thompson '16.

“As long as you have the support and structure in place or a teacher who is enthusiastic about putting it in place, it’s easier than you might think to start a club like this at Carroll,” Harrison said. “Mrs. Thompson was energetic about getting us involved.”

Mia and Mrs. Thompson met about once a month over the summer to lay the groundwork for the rest of the club members and work through logistical hurdles to register for the conference scheduled for December 2022. Once the school year began, they met two or three times a month with the other 14 club members to prepare resolutions for the countries they chose to represent at the conference: Nicaragua, Fiji, and Nigeria.

The three geographically and politically diverse nations offered the students an opportunity to focus on a specific problem facing those countries and work within the UN’s 17 goals to solve it. The group representing Fiji proposed building more hydroelectric dams to



help grow tourism while preserving the country’s natural resources and beauty. The delegation for Nigeria chose to build resource centers for the country’s citizens. For Nicaragua, the delegation led by Mia, the students proposed that the UN oversee the country’s elections to ensure a fair outcome and protect citizens who express dissent over the current regime’s policies.

All three groups presented their country’s resolution. Out of 150 resolutions prepared by students across Ohio, the Nicaraguan delegation was one of 35 to pass the preliminary security council for presentation to the General Assembly for debate to become official UN policy.

“I was ecstatic to be able to present in that room,” Harrison said. “Your bill is read, and other members of the

conference either attempt to destroy or support it. I had been waiting to do this my entire high school career, and it finally happened. I felt blessed and grateful that we put this together.”

Although the bill did not become policy, Mia and the rest of the students were grateful for a true cross-curricular experience. After learning about injustices in Central America during Spanish and religion classes, researching their nations and writing resolutions showed the students where the UN Goals and Catholic Social Teaching overlap.

“When you look at the seven components of Catholic Social Teaching, you see that they align very closely with the UN Goals,” Harrison said. “What the goals of the UN and Catholic church are trying to do are similar to what a lot of people want the world to be like, and Carroll lets it be known that we are working towards those goals.”

EARN A DOLLAR-FOR-DOLLAR TAX CREDIT ON OHIO INCOME TAXES WHEN YOU GIVE TO ARCHBISHOP CARROLL HIGH SCHOOL

The State of Ohio has passed a bill that allows a tax credit for qualified donations to a certified Scholarship Granting Organization (SGO). Ohio taxpayers who donate to SGOs may be able to claim a dollar-for-dollar, non-refundable tax credit on their Ohio income tax return for up to \$750 per donor or up to \$1,500 if married and filing jointly.

HOW CAN I GIVE TO CARROLL THROUGH THIS PROGRAM?

Make your gift through the Archdiocese of Cincinnati's Catholic Education Foundation (CEF), a certified SGO with the State of Ohio. Designate Archbishop Carroll High School as your school of choice to ensure that your entire gift is directed to our school. You can make your gift online or through a sending a check attached to a mail-in form.

HOW DO I CLAIM THE CREDIT ON MY TAX RETURN?

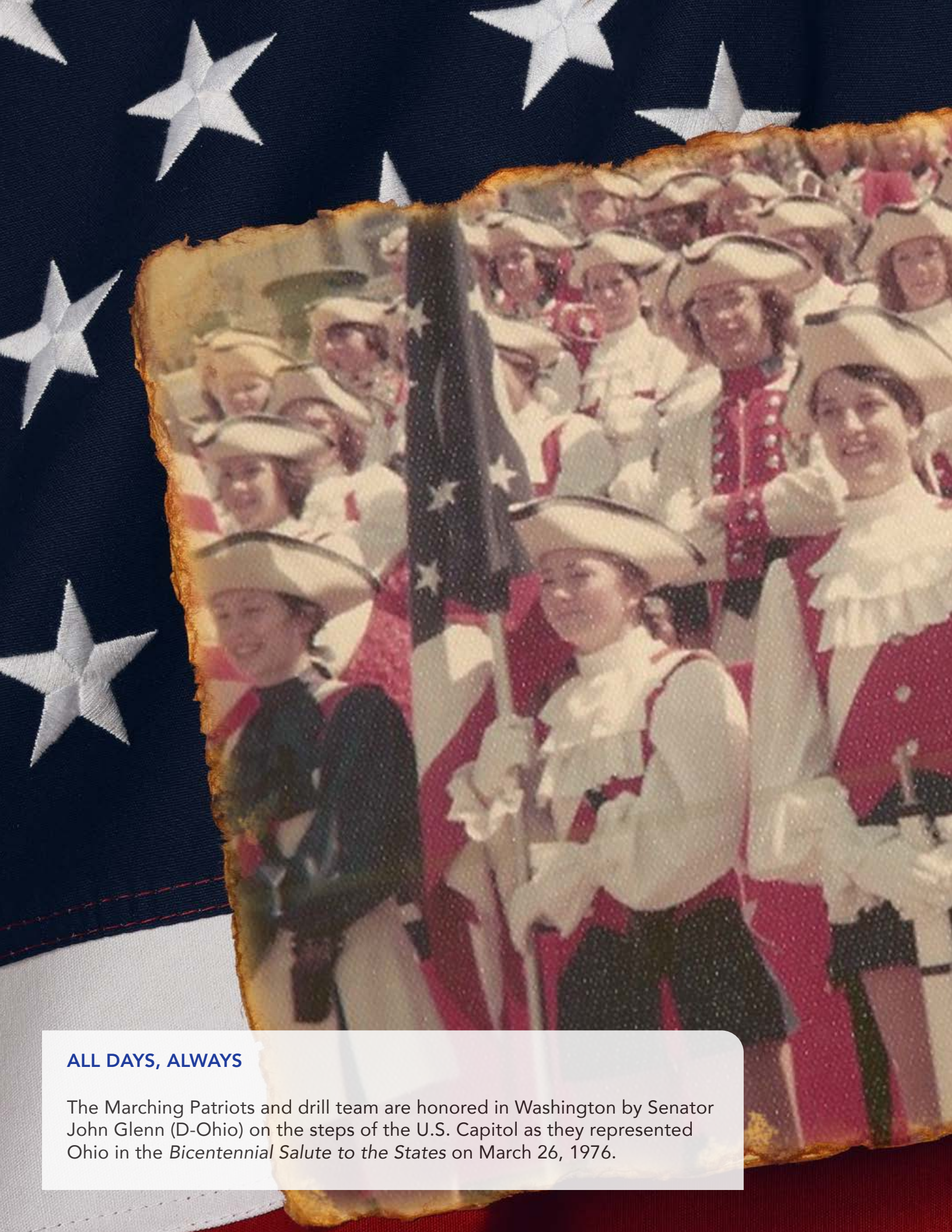
Shortly after your gift has been received and processed, the CEF-SGO will mail a gift acknowledgement letter to you. This letter can serve as documentation for a non-refundable Ohio income tax credit (up to \$750 per donor across all SGO donations for the tax year) when you prepare your Ohio income tax return.

WHAT ELSE SHOULD I KNOW ABOUT THIS PROGRAM?

Everyone's tax situation is different, and we encourage you to check with your tax preparation professional to determine if this is the best way for you to make a gift and help offset your state and federal tax liabilities.
