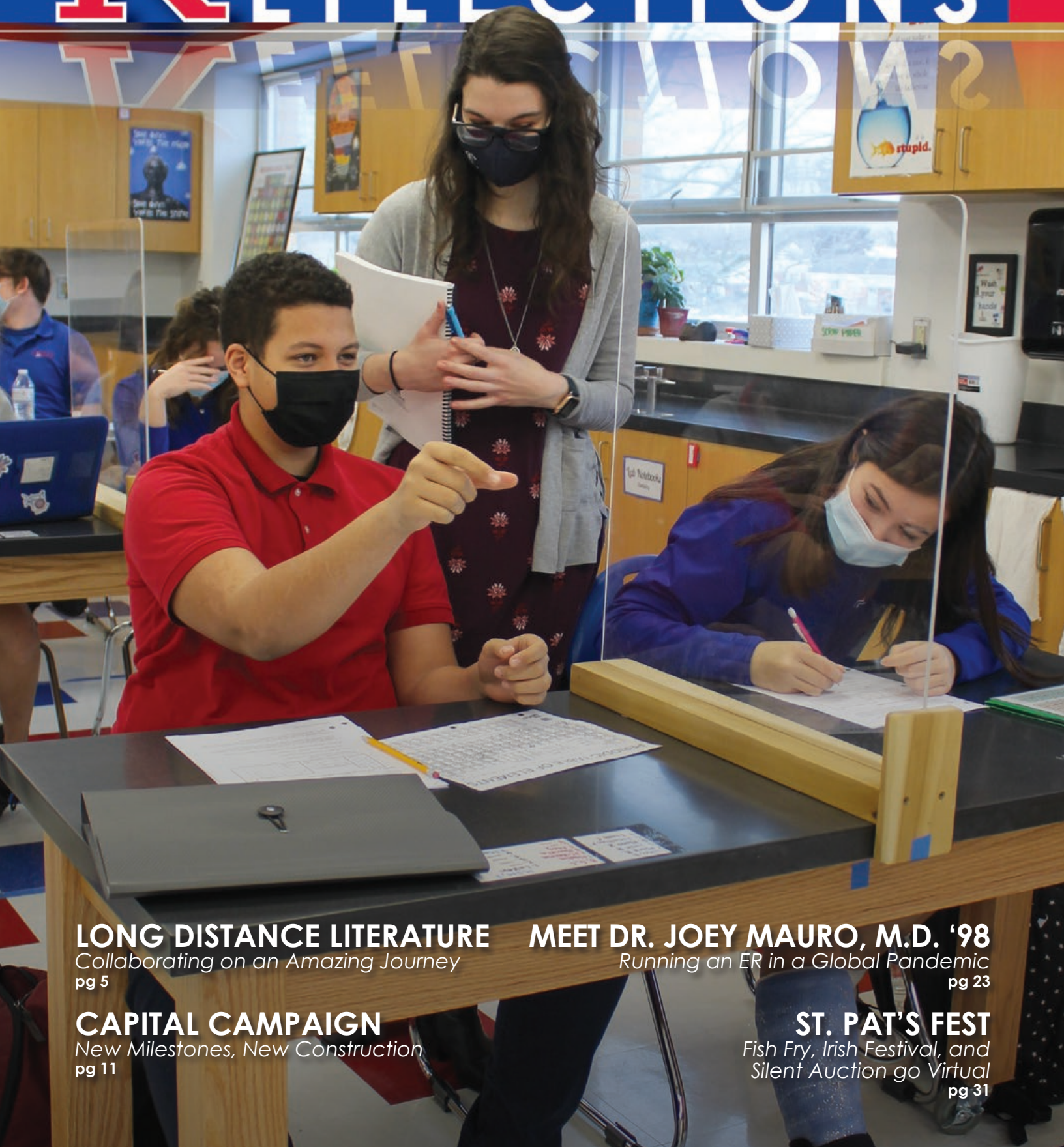

It is the “best of times” to be a Carroll Patriot!

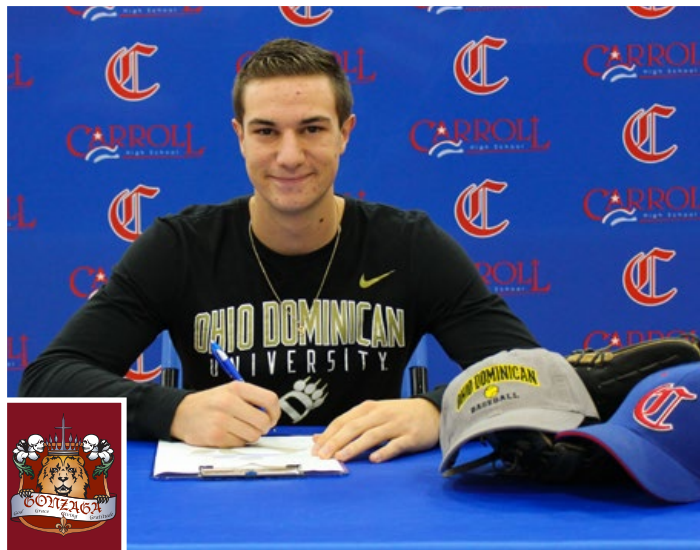

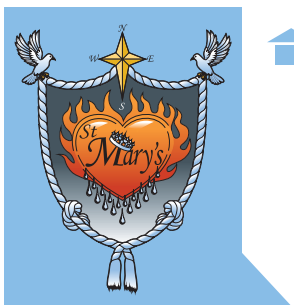
🏠 GONZAGA

SPOTLIGHTS on our Patriot Student Community

A brief look at some of the current highlights from within and around our amazing student community.

ACADEMICS

» Seniors earn national awards for National Merit Scholarship Qualification Test Results

Josie Rose '21 and Cameron Neidhard '21 earned distinction as National Merit Scholarship Semifinalists, adding to the list of Patriot scholars who have placed among the nation's top students. The National Merit Scholarship Qualification Test determines NMS honorees in addition to preparing high school students for college entrance tests and demonstrating their college readiness.



- These students gained this recognition by achieving at least a 215 selection index on the College Board's 2019 PSAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualification Test. The highest possible selection index is 228.
- Carroll High School has the most NMS Semifinalists of any Catholic high school in Montgomery County.
- A total of 681 students from 188 high schools in Ohio were named NMS Semifinalists.
- 14 Carroll High School students have been recognized in the NMS competition as Semifinalists or Commended Scholars since 2017.

Christian Anguiano '21 was named a College Board National Recognition Program Scholar for his performance on the NMSQT. This program spotlights students who score in the top 2.5% of test takers and indicate that they are African American, Hispanic or Latinx, Indigenous, or attend school in a rural area or small town.



» Ohio Academy of Science honors Carroll STEM students for second time in three years

The Ohio Academy of Science awarded Carroll High School the Harold C. Shaw Memorial Award, its highest honor, for the second time in three years at its Virtual State Science Day.

Carroll High School's group of 19 student researchers presented their STEM research projects virtually to comply with social distance and health orders instead of the traditional, in-person format. That didn't stop 14 students from adjusting their presentations to earn the highest rating of superior. The five other students earned the second-highest rating of excellent, meeting the OAS's criteria for the Shaw Award. Schools must send at least four students to present research, and 80% of those projects must earn a Superior rating. All projects must earn an *Excellent* rating or higher, and all students who register for the event must present his/her research.

Carroll was the only high school in the Dayton region to earn the Shaw Award in 2020, and this is the second time Carroll has earned the award since 2018. 13 Patriots earned special awards in their research categories for outstanding projects.



» Creative Writing Students navigate hybrid learning, alternate dimensions with Mr. HH and Write-On

Learning teamwork through collaboration in the classroom is one of the most important lessons students can learn, and like most other aspects of education, grew into a greater challenge because of coronavirus. That challenge did not stop the students in Creative Writing from creating and navigating a fantastic journey for themselves and their literature. Early in the fall, Mrs. Marcy (Hemmert) Hughes '83 encouraged her students to think of ideas for a semester-long project that everyone would help



create. Michael Moylan '21 told his classmates about an unnamed character he dreamed up who would become the focal point of their writing.

"I had this idea bumping around my head that I had already written a few chapters of myself about a guy who goes to different dimensions," Moylan said. "He's just an average, ordinary guy like someone you might see in the hallways of Carroll or buying things at the grocery store. One day, he starts teleporting around to alternate dimensions and has no idea why. It's completely random, and anything can happen in his universe. I thought it would be good as a small assignment, but she snowballed it from there."

The class named the character Mr. HH and set the basic framework of his character traits so that their anthology would have some consistency. Mr. HH started out as a senior in high school, but the group decided he should be older because some of the themes would not apply to a high school student. In some stories, he is still a teenager straight out of high school, but in others, he is as old as 60. Each story is a stand alone tale from different phases of his life, and Mrs. Hughes wrote an epilogue to piece it all together.

As the semester progressed, the students found ways to collaborate while following health and safety guidelines to prevent the spread of COVID-19. Each writer shared their drafts in Google Classroom and Google Docs to help replace close quarter, one-on-one feedback and editing sessions. Like many professionals had done since the spring, the students embraced video conferencing when remote learning split the class in two groups. Despite all the challenges, the students were able to finish the tale of Mr. HH before the end of the fall semester. ART

» Victoria Fowler '21 - Evolution of an Artist

Victoria Fowler's first experiences with art were more necessity than creative outlet. Her grandfather James worked at Wright Patterson Air Force Base as a civilian employee, and she would frequently tag along to his meetings on base before she was even a kindergarten student. Before they would leave for the meetings, James would always bring a stack of paper and handful of crayons along with them, and Victoria created her first trademark pieces.

"I called them stained-glass butterflies," Fowler says. "I would draw a butterfly then break it up into a stained glass window and color each piece. They were my favorite thing to draw growing up."



As Victoria grew and refined her skills, she began finding inspiration in vintage items like old toys and well-worn clothing. She also traded her crayons for ink pens and colored pencils to bring her visions of realism to life. She has submitted four of her works to the Scholastic Art Show for judgement as part of her Advanced Placement Art exam, including a drawing of an old pair of shoes. The piece reflects her artistic style as well as the ways she finds inspiration to create.

Victoria will find out if that or any of her other pieces qualify for state and national contests in the spring. For now, she hopes that people who see her art can take a moment to reflect on the messages her works hold.

"Just appreciate it. Art is sometimes overlooked in schools, so just take the time to really look at a piece and see what the artist has put in there for you to see. There's always a part of the artist in every work that they're trying to show you."

» Virtual Play

When Christian Triplett '21 approached director Toni (Hemmert) Weitz '86 in 2018 with a full-length play he had written, she knew that the piece was something special to be showcased during Christian's senior year at Carroll. With the coronavirus threatening theatre programs across the world, the only way to guarantee that the show would go on this year would be to make the show completely remote and presented on a virtual platform.

Inspired by film noir parody episodes that his childhood shows almost always featured, Christian wrote *All Eyes on You*, his own film noir parody. With helpful feedback from Carroll alumnus and professional playwright Thomas Hischak '69, Triplett spent this past summer revising, reworking, and reformatting the script for its official debut this past December. The play features detective Jordan (Francis Kosir '21) fighting to save the life of his newfound love interest, Chelsea (Grace Bete '23), and his town, from a motley crew of mobsters (lead by the Godfather, Chris Sorrell '83).

"This show marks a lot of firsts for the Freedom Players: first student-written production, first staging of Christian's script, first virtual play, and first full-length production featuring a collaboration of current Carroll students and alumni," said director Rachel (Niemer) Barnell '06, "and the students and alumni were really excited to both be involved in the show and to perform in a show that could not be cancelled due to the coronavirus."

The show was shot over two weeks on Zoom with the actors filming from their homes. "It felt weird going to practice while also being able to pet my cat or get a snack," student director Amy Schiffler '21 recalled. The actors essentially became their own costume designers and sound/light technicians for the show. "I needed to be able to teach actors about how they should light themselves," said technical director Emma Meyer '22, "which is nothing I have ever done before. But, I was able to take my knowledge of stage lighting and adapt it to work in the actors' homes." *All Eyes on You* is available to stream at carrollhs.org/freedom-players until December 2021.



SERVICE

» Carroll Students engage in heart (and foot) warming service projects

The Carroll Campus Ministry team saw the growing need to help local Dayton organizations in assisting families in need during the pandemic. Wanting to serve the community while also keeping student volunteers safe, they partnered with Carroll alumni on several projects to serve families in need in Dayton.

This past October, the Campus Ministry team organized two week-long drives: Socktober, an October sock drive, and a coat drive. In just a week's time, Carroll students and staff collected more than 700 pairs of socks and 100 coats to donate to Catholic Social Services and to St. Vincent DePaul for Dayton families in need.

The warmth from the Carroll community did not stop there. Martha (Sikora) Holda '67, who volunteers with Dayton Right to Life's Stork's Nest, a Baby/child pantry for families in need, was working on a project there this past winter that she thought would be ideal for the Carroll students. The Stork's Nest was collecting no-sew blankets, and Holda supplied Mrs. Melissa (Balsom) Fisher '83 with all of the materials for the project. Students worked on the blankets with members of their House Family Rooms, with campus ministry after school, and even took some home to work on with their families. Other alumni heard about the project, and they too came by to pick up materials and make up blankets for the Stork's Nest. So far, students and alumni have made and donated over 70 blankets.

» Sam Schlegel '21: Personal growth through service to others

Sam Schlegel '21 was not always excited about opportunities to perform community service. While his family regularly helped with service projects at Ascension Church, Sam's role as a child was limited to things like carrying around items for the parish's Giving Tree project. His outlook started to change once he saw his older siblings Anna '14, Nicholas '15, and Maria '18 performing their own inspired, not required, service projects as Carroll students.

"At first, I thought it was really boring and not much fun. Then, I noticed that they were enjoying it, so I figured if I tried it, I would enjoy it a bit more," Schlegel says. "Also, it felt better spiritually when I was doing service. There's always a God instance that you can feel and see God through your service if you reflect and pay attention to what you're doing with your service projects."

Sam's reserved demeanor led him to seek projects where he was indirectly helping others away from the spotlight. He has written letters to members of the United States military stationed overseas and helped raise future service dogs this past summer at 4 Paws for Ability as part of Carroll's Faith in Action course. When he adds it all up, Sam has performed nearly 600 hours of community service as a Carroll student with one semester left as a Patriot.



"At Carroll, there are so many opportunities to get involved. There's probably a one hour service project that everyone can do every day. Some are just packing a truck with clothes and toys to be sent somewhere, and some are going to the House of Bread or tutoring younger students. It really doesn't feel like [that many] hours. Doing service is something I enjoy, and time flies when you're having fun."

» Fighting the challenging coronavirus with a Coronavirus Service Challenge

When Carroll's usual service opportunities that involve traveling to volunteer sites became unavailable due to health restrictions, the Carroll Campus Ministry team needed to find ways to continue to serve the Dayton community while also keeping student volunteers safe. They also wanted to make sure that their projects were working towards building the domestic church in students' homes and encouraging positive encounters with fellow students and their families.

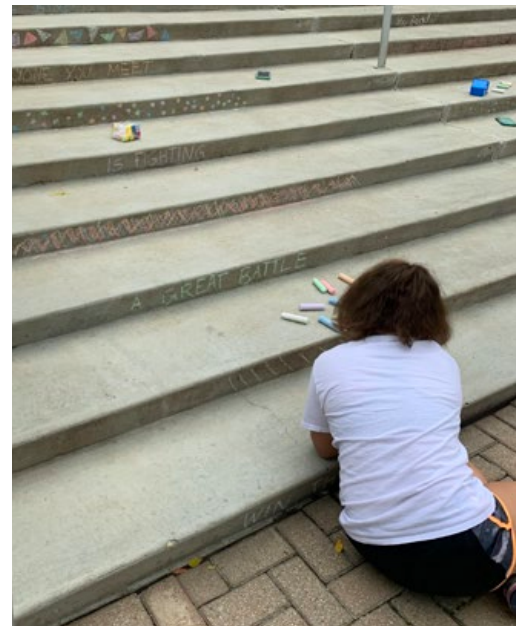
From that came the idea of the Carroll Coronavirus Challenge, an event held every Tuesday after school where students could give back to both their fellow students and for others in need through various projects.

"The students know there is a need, and they don't know where to go. Since they can't go to places [to serve], they have to be creative here," said Service Coordinator Melissa (Balsom) Fisher '83, and they found many opportunities to creatively care for the Carroll family and other community members in need.

When principal Matthew Sableski '91 would host Chalk Talk information sessions in the building, the students would make chalk art out on the sidewalks around the building to welcome visitors into the building. On other Tuesdays, students would create posters featuring positive words of encouragement to hang on the walls of the school to help boost student morale and promote positivity. For the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays, students made placemats and created cheerful cards filled with well-wishes for several of the local nursing homes in Dayton.

For Maggie Ollier '21, the change in service activities were very meaningful, especially since she was mostly serving her fellow classmates. "It's not about going to another place to serve. We're able to serve right where we are, and there is so much to do," she said. "By serving others, we can all be good stewards and good Christians."

"Now, more than ever, it's important to serve others because we're alone for so much of [the pandemic], and it is easy to be self-centered. So it's good to spend our time serving others and serving the people who need it more than ever. It's been more powerful and more meaningful."



MARCHING SAFELY THROUGH A PANDEMIC

In November of 2019, the music staff and design team began planning the Marching Patriots' 2020 production, totally unaware of the global crisis that would occur months later and the impact it would have on our marching band season.

We decided on the title *Alone*. The idea was based on some inspiring source music by Sergei Rachmaninoff and Eric Carmen. Our vision was to produce a competition show that would feature several soloists and use theatrical staging to isolate individuals from the rest of the group.

Fast-forward to March 13th, 2020 and this concept became quite ironic.

Would we be allowed to compete? Would it be possible to get the students together for rehearsals? What motivates the students to perform at their highest level? The unknowns were overwhelming

for students and staff alike, but collectively we stayed optimistic.

Once July rolled around, it was clear that we would not be traveling, competing, or rehearsing in the same fashion that we traditionally had, but one thing became clear: the students were ready and willing to work. As a staff, we had numerous conversations about our goals for the students. Safety was our first priority. Secondly, we agreed



that every day together was a blessing and that we would do everything in our power to make the experience fun and memorable for the students. The kids recognized that their efforts yielded rewards in different ways, through personal growth, appreciation of a creative outlet, and development of interpersonal relationships.

“The 2020 season was a much-needed break from isolation,” Drum Major Audrey Kneer ‘21 said. “It was different with no competitions to look forward to, but it meant that we were honing our skills for our own growth. I’m grateful for the opportunity we had.”

The season pressed on without a competitive outlet, but the band and guard members gave it their all. We were fortunate to have several unique performance opportunities for families and friends of the students. Most importantly, the students pushed each other to perform every day to their fullest potential. Despite being “Alone” throughout much of this school year, we are reminded of this inspiring quote by legendary football coach, Vince Lombardi: “Individual commitment to a group effort: this is what makes a team work, a company work, a society work, a civilization work.”

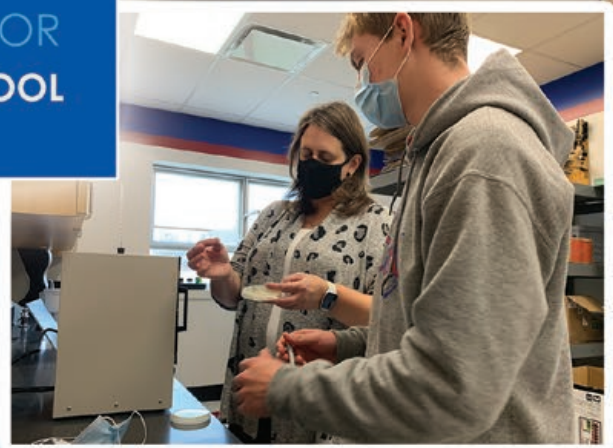

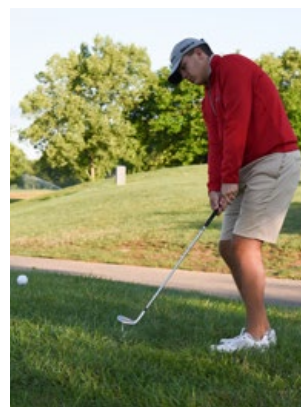
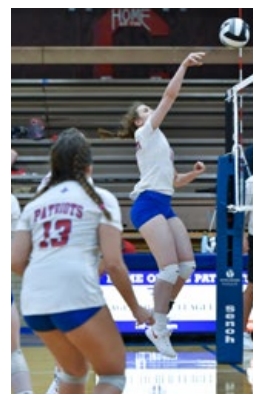

STUDENT REFLECTION Sarah Ruetschle '21

The thought of going back to school in the middle of a pandemic was, quite frankly, terrifying. I'd heard no word about what the next school year would look like as I finished out my junior year, and news about what might happen was slow throughout the summer. Even with all the assurances that school would resume in the fall, I knew that it would not resemble what I knew Carroll to be from my previous years there.

The start of this year was strange. While I was aware of the changes that I should expect and all the new rules before I stepped foot into the building, seeing how everything fit into place was odd. It was a relief to see all of my classmates and teachers again after such a long separation, but the new requirements in the classrooms and hallways and the unfamiliar schedules made it difficult for me to see the Carroll High School of which I had been so accustomed.

While some of the superficial aspects have changed, the fundamentals of Carroll High School remain: supportive and engaging teachers, an opportunity to meet new people, and, most importantly, a quality education. Teachers still provide the standard of education that is the expectation of any Carroll parent. They also inspire an environment in which students can still engage with each other when we can't see each other in person; or are separated by safety protocols while still providing the best academic learning Carroll has to offer.

While the rules and regulations can make it difficult to interact with each other, both online and in-person, the faculty and staff has made it a priority to encourage the school community not to break apart, but to grow closer during this time. Offering weekly opportunities for students to eat

lunch with others in their grades and attempting to reconfigure past traditions and activities to suit the current needs are just some of the many ways that the Carroll community has been bolstered to remain the close-knit community it always has been. Despite the many challenges, we have been able to still put on the yearly fall play, have a modified homecoming, engage in almost all sporting events, and still remain in school for a great deal of the year.

Family Room, once a short segment of time squished into the middle of the day, has become a staple in the daily lives of all students. Spending time in Family Room for an hour a day has strengthened the connection students have with those in their Family Room. Instead of only seeing each other for 12 or 24 minutes, four days a week, students now spend an hour in Family Room everyday, eating lunch and participating in activities meant to brighten their day and bring them closer together. While many long treasured activities have been discarded due to Covid19 regulations, new activities and games have taken their place. Instead of being crowded into a gym for physical activities, my Family Room took advantage of the good weather in the fall and went outside to eat lunch and to play socially distant games on the new athletic field multiple days a week. When it got too cold to go outside, we switched to different activities that can still be enjoyable for the entire room, but still keep everyone safe.

Although we all have to remain socially distant, our community has only grown closer together. Situations that none of us could have expected have arisen and together, as a community, we have faced them and been able to prove just how much being a member of the Carroll community can change our lives by providing the resources to face adversity and overcome it while keeping our heads held high. While we may not know what the future will bring, we know that amidst the ever changing world around us, we will face it together and, with the Carroll spirit, surpass all expectations.

Over the past decade, Dr. Joey Mauro '98 has helped treat patients with the most dire injuries and conditions to come through the doors of the Miami Valley Hospital emergency room as an ER physician. Saving lives from heart attacks, strokes, and traumatic injuries are common in Dr. Mauro's line of work, but a recently added responsibility has put him at the forefront of how his hospital decides how to treat COVID-19 patients while keeping others in the building safe from the virus.

When he became the Medical Director of the Miami Valley Hospital Emergency Room in 2018, he began splitting his time between seeing patients at all of the Premiere Health Network's hospitals and developing processes and policies for ER operations. Devising plans to isolate patients, quarantine people with severe symptoms of COVID-19, and protect staff from contracting the virus as COVID-19 grew into a global pandemic in March 2020 suddenly became the top priority for Dr. Mauro.

"Initially, it was the fear of the unknown and not knowing what to expect as everything was very new and unprecedented," Dr. Mauro recalls. "At first, people were only at risk if they traveled to certain areas of the world. Once we shifted to community transmission, we dealt with a lot of uncertainty regarding patient volume, acuity, PPE stock, medical equipment inventory, staffing concerns, and hospital real-estate to be able to provide for the increased volume of patients. We watched in fear of places like New York, Chicago, New Orleans, and Miami that were getting hit hard early on as their resources were being significantly stressed. That level of stress on the medical community was really something that I've never seen in the United States in my years as an ER physician."

Frequent hand washing, mask wearing, social distancing, and the other basic precautions that became part of everyday life outside of medical settings this past spring became renewed commitments in the exam rooms as well as the waiting areas and hallways for everyone at the hospitals. Dr. Mauro and the rest of the administrators at Premiere Health also implemented many other actions that are happening at schools, restaurants, and gathering places around the world to help stop the spread of the disease.

"We need to make sure patients are maintaining social isolation. In the waiting room, we have less chairs available and we have lots of processes set up in the waiting room to keep people protected at a safe distance. We have also had to implement visitor limitations to mitigate exposure from people coming in and out of the hospital."

They are also taking closer looks at the patients who come to the ER with coronavirus symptoms and created a separate entrance, triage, and treatment area of the ER for high risk respiratory patients. The doors in this treatment area are kept closed, anyone who enters must wear full personal protective equipment, and thorough



cleaning and disinfection is performed between each patient to keep the patients and the rest of the medical staff safe while they provide critical care to all of their patients.

"It's been much more difficult to take care of patients in the time of COVID-19 because there's been a lot of uncertainty. When patients come into the ER, we don't know if they have COVID or not. They may have respiratory symptoms or coughs, or they may not have any related symptoms at all and end up testing positive. We try to cohort known COVID positive and high risk respiratory patients in certain areas of the hospital, and that's created a lot of significant challenges to screen those patients and make sure they end up in the right place so they aren't putting other patients and hospital staff at risk."

All of the changes to hospital procedures that Dr. Mauro and his colleagues implemented along with the mandated state shut-down did help to keep hospital volume and infection rates low throughout the spring and summer, but the number of new cases have quickly and steadily rose through the first weeks of winter. In December, Miami Valley Hospital was seeing 40-50 patients each day who had COVID symptoms. Dr. Mauro says that is an exponential increase from the fall and something they anticipate will continue through the first part of 2021 at all the hospitals in the Dayton area. He is optimistic that cases will start falling as we move forward through

the new year, especially with the arrival of the COVID-19 vaccine. Like many of the Premiere Health Network staffers, Dr. Mauro chose to receive the vaccine. Most people that receive the vaccine have reported only mild pain and discomfort at the injection site. However, a small proportion have short term headaches, myalgias, and chills. This is a small price to pay for some normalcy once again.

“As a medical community, we are excited and hopeful that this vaccine will work to help mitigate the significant stress that this virus has caused the medical system. We are tired as this virus has taken a toll on the medical community physically, emotionally, and psychologically. We’ve done everything we can as a community with social distancing, isolation, wearing masks, and washing our hands. I am very hopeful that this vaccine, as vaccines have been shown to do throughout history, will help decrease the amount of people who are getting infected and exposed and eventually eradicate this virus. I see this as a major turning point.”

Throughout it all, Dr. Mauro says his years as a student at Carroll have been crucial to overcoming challenges he has faced during the pandemic. **He had no idea that he would end up choosing a career as a physician while he was a high school student, but learning to solve problems and staying committed to a cause are skills he learned in Carroll classrooms.**

“With anything, you need a strong foundation to build on, and I definitely got that at Carroll. The harder you work when you’re younger to build that foundation of critical thinking, study skills, and being disciplined, the less you’ll have to work when you’re older because you can depend on and grow on that foundation. There’s no substitute for hard work when it comes to gaining success. I was very lucky to come across many teachers and coaches at Carroll that helped shape and build the foundation of the person I am today.”

As Dr. Mauro looks ahead to the coming months, he sees reasons to be optimistic about finally ending the



pandemic that has consumed much of the world. Despite rising cases to start 2021, he expects cases to fall as more people receive the vaccine.

“Even if everyone gets the vaccine, it will take many months until we see the true effects of the vaccination. The next few months should be mostly the same: being aware, being socially responsible, washing your hands, wearing a mask, and staying home if you’re feeling sick. I don’t see a lot of that changing in the near future, but hopefully, the numbers will go down. If the vaccination is utilized and works we will hopefully beat this disease and get back to pre-COVID life.”

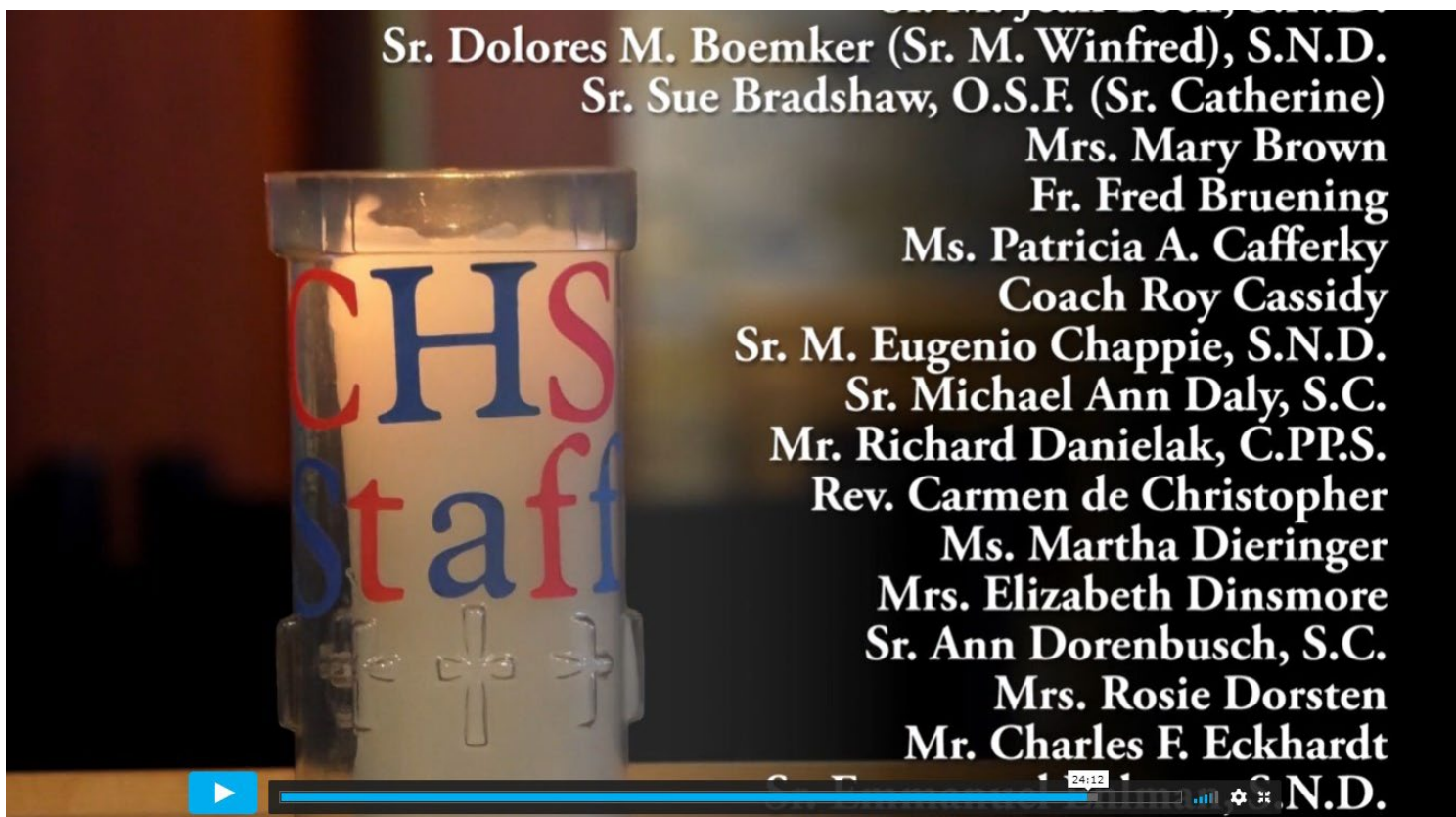

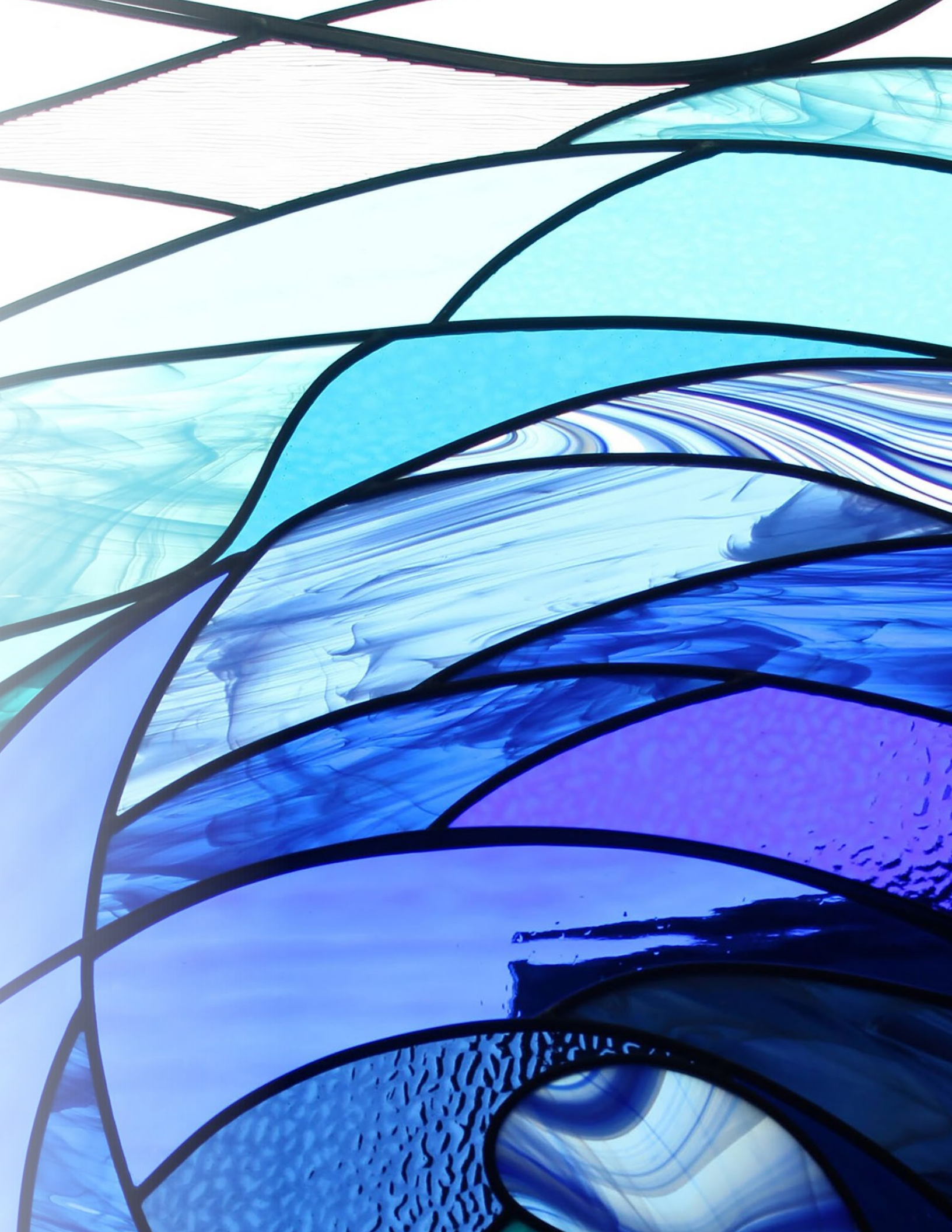
