

SPOTLIGHTS on our Academics, Service & Arts

A brief look at some of the current highlights from within and around our amazing student community.



» Junior Ashton Najarian entered an exhibit in the **44th Ohio Governor's Youth Art Exhibition** this spring. Over 12,000 9th - 12th graders submitted art entries to 15 regional offices in Ohio, with 3,000 sent to the exhibition. Ashton's art exhibit was one of just 300 works of art chosen, which was displayed at the James A. Rhodes State Office Tower in Columbus.

» 120 Foreign Language students took the Sinclair Community College Language Proficiency Test. 96% received WebCAPE college credit. These credits may transfer to the college or university of the student's choice. Students can earn up to 14 credit hours.

» The Computer Science and Robotics Department received a generous donation of a 3D printer from Carroll alum, Michael J. Crichton '98. In the engineering and robotics curriculum, the 3D printer will be utilized in teaching the engineering design process to promote thinking, reasoning and understanding of mathematics and science. The students will continually research, plan, design and evaluate to create a better product. In addition to teaching the engineering design process, printed models can be used to illustrate concepts in mathematics. This technology will be important to prepare students for a world in which similar technologies will be increasingly commonplace. According to Crichton, "Going forward, I believe automated manufacturing will prove to be the separating factor in competition between the US and the third world countries that have large, cheap labor forces. As a professional engineer, my society has asked engineers to help invigorate K-12 programs with STEM information and instructions. I believe this type of exposure for students would be a great introductory towards these goals."

» The Industrial Technology program received a lathe, generously donated by Jack Glaser '69. This lathe will allow students to expand their skills to create smaller, more detail-oriented projects. Combined with Auto-CAD, laser cutters and innovative software, creation of these intricate projects takes students from creative design conception, through computer programs, to the hands-on build of the project.

» Two very successful pull tab campaigns were conducted this year for Ronald McDonald House. Youth-in-Government and the Family & Consumer Science Club, along with the help of Mrs. Fisher, collected 118.57 lbs. of pop tabs which were turned in at Tabapalooza, held at the 2nd St. Market. Thanks go out to everyone involved, including all the students and their families, faculty and staff that participated. Ronald McDonald House is a tremendous charity that has supported several families in the Carroll community. Keep collecting - this campaign will continue in the new school year!

» Philanthropy is an integral part of wealth management. Carroll's Personal Finance classes study a unit on philanthropy, understanding that the responsibility of financial success is giving back and improving areas of need. The juniors and seniors study microfinance by learning about the Bank of Grameen and make a microloan to a woman in need through Kiva (www.kiva.org). Students research other organizations that provide opportunities for personal investment with the goal of improving others' lives and livelihoods. Several Carroll alumni have come in to class to speak, including Mr. Jack Glaser '69, Mrs. Peggy (Miller) Ruhlin '67 and Mr. Larry Blanford '72 and his wife, Mrs. Lynn (Volk) Blanford '78. The Finance students get a clearer picture of their future possibilities as successful and fortunate Carroll graduates. A small or large contribution of money, talent or time can change the lives of many for future generations. This is a true lesson in giving back.

» The Consumer & Family Science Club spent a Saturday cooking brunch for guests at Dayton's Ronald McDonald House. The club prepared ham, sausage and cheese quiches, assorted fruit bowls, breakfast sweets and juices for the twenty-five guests. The families and staff were very appreciative of the homemade food and the Family & Consumer Science Club members that attended had an enjoyable time serving them.

» In January, 30 students and four chaperones attended the March For Life in Washington, D.C.. This annual pilgrimage is always an amazing experience. Students also enjoyed tours through the Smithsonian Museums, Capitol Building, Arlington Cemetary, Holocaust Museum and several memorials and monuments while in our nation's capital. Students attend a conference sponsored by Students For Life For America, where speakers share their personal witness to the value of

Students also attended a youth rally and Mass at the Verizon Center. Carroll teacher and chaperone, Mrs. Jill Kilby, shares, "What a joy to see thousands of students from around the United States praising God and praying for an end to abortion." After the Mass, the students "marched for life" in frigid temperatures, but with heartwarming feeling of marching in solidarity with thousands. This trip provides an opportunity for students to stand up for their beliefs and to see they are not alone in this Pro-Life movement!

» Mike Menart, Elise Paietta and alternate, Matthew Hixenbaugh, advanced to the elite Intel International Science & Engineering Fair (ISEF), held May 11-16 in Los Angeles, CA. **Out of five spots available to area students, three spots were awarded to these Patriots!** ISEF is the world's largest international pre-college science competition, providing an annual forum for more than 1,700 high school students from over 70 countries, regions and territories! Elise Paietta, who qualified for ISEF last year, received a Third Grand Award, and \$1,000, in Animal Sciences for her project, "Autism in Fruit Flies II: Behavior of Drosophila on GLUR Pathway Mutants."

» Mr. Andy Seyfang's Economics class seized the opportunity to attend the Dayton RISE (Redefining Investment Strategy Education) 2014, the largest student investment conference in the world. Sponsored by UD, in association with the United Nations Global Compact, more than 150 universities and other academic institutions participated. Sandra Pianalto, Federal Reserve Bank President, delivered the keynote address. RISE brings together leaders in academia, business, government, finance and media, along with top global finance students, to conduct interactive panel discussions. It is a dynamic exchange of ideas and questions. Senior Mercedes Warren shares, "I enjoyed the variety of speakers that spoke at this event. I felt their talks related to what we were learning in class."



» Nine Carroll students, out of a field of 125 applications, were selected to participate in the 2014 Wright Scholar program. These students spent the summer working with their WPAFB mentors on scientific research. » Forty-one students, five Carroll teachers, two UD Graduate students, one, a Carroll alum, and a Catholic Social Action office staff member, completed over 1600 hours of service on the annual Christian Justice & Service Camp, held the second week of June. This Carroll Theology course allows students to fully integrate their Peace & Justice course with real-world, service-learning experience. Participants served with many Dayton-area agencies, including House of Bread, Mission of Mary Farms, Habitat For Humanity, Wegerzyn and Sugarcreek Metroparks, The Glen, Aim for the Handicapped, Rebuilding Together - Dayton, East End Community Center, St. Vincent de Paul Women's Shelter and Food Pantry, Catholic Social Services Food Pantry, Catholic Social Services, Miami Valley Family Care Center and Clubhouse in Dayton and the Trotwood areas. They listened to an engineer with Heapy Engineering, learning how to live and work in an environmentally safe way while learning about sustainability, as well. Carroll alum and Dayton City Commissioner, Matt Joseph '90, spoke with camp participants about serving as a Catholic in a political world. Past Carroll parent, Dick Ferguson, from UD Fitz Center spoke with them about service, as well as Sr. Joan Krimm, relating the story of Sr. Dorothy Stang. Learning about immigration issues, while learning the Mexican tradition of salsa dancing, was a unique highlight of their week. Camp director, Mrs. Melissa Fisher, states, "It takes a village to make this service camp happen. Many thanks to the parents who helped with driving during the day and supervision during the evenings!"







Catholic social teaching. While there, Blanford was named Corporate Responsible Organization Magazine's "Responsible CEO of the Year" two years in a row: 2009 and 2010. Sr. Mary Alice Stein, S.C., Honorary Patriot

After taking religious vows as a Sister of Charity in 1959, Sr. Mary Alice (originally known as Sr. Anne Robert) came to Carroll High School to teach English in September of 1967. Known for her sense of humor, she taught English and Latin at Carroll for 43 years until she retired in 2010. Besides teaching, she moderated the junior and senior classes, Torch staff, and eventually directed fall plays and spring musicals. Mary Alice motivated her students to take huge strides, prayerfully lifting them up when they fell. She has spent her life giving to others - a true Patriot who enjoys visiting CHS, seeing the students and giving a pat on the back to fellow faculty and staff. Her awards include Teacher of the Year (2 times from the senior class), Religious Person of the Year (2003 from Knights of Columbus Council 500), and Outstanding Teacher of the Year (1992 from Miami Valley Council). She received a MA from John Carroll University and a BA from the College of Mount St. Joseph.



Michael D. Lofino, Class of 1965

Inducted into the Ohio Grocers Hall of Fame in 2010, Mike is known for his entrepreneurial talent and success in growing his father's grocery business, Lofino Food Stores. In 1974, Mike built a new 32,500 sq. ft. store on Sea Jay Drive in Beavercreek and eventually purchased 4 Cub Stores in Dayton, 3 Save-A-Lots in Dayton, 2 Save-A-Lots in Colorado, 5 Save-A-Lots in Columbus, and 5 Save-A-Lots in Indianapolis. Over the years, Mike has been a tireless champion for the local community and has received numerous awards and accolades. His generosity has included scholarships and endowments in support of education, land donations to the Beavercreek YMCA, and challenge gifts to the community theater and to the senior adult and cultural enrichment center that moved into the old Lofino store. He has also served on advisory committees at Notre Dame and its law school and donated generously to Carroll High School and its reunions, Easter Egg Hunts, and alumni socials.



Carole A. Hohl, Class of 1967

Carole is a dedicated physician assistant who has spent her career caring for those most in need, working with the homeless and vulnerable populations since 1988. She also developed a multidisciplinary clinical team to treat HIV-infected homeless people that is a model for the entire country. Carole received her MHS from Duke University, summa cum laude, and her BS in Biology/Chemistry from the University of Detroit, magna cum laude. She also received the Richard Scheeley Award for Scholarship and Leadership from Duke University; the Local Hero Award from National Health Care for the Homeless Clinicians Network; and the Tom Bennett Award for advocacy - improving the lives or living situations of patients and for developing new and innovative models of service to patients. Carole received the Ryan White federal grant as Director of HIV Services at Boston Health Care for the Homeless Program; is a speaker at local/national conferences; and is a committed wife, mother and grandmother.



Stephen K. Haller, Class of 1968

Steve has spent 39 years with the Greene County Prosecutor's Office and was elected Prosecutor in 2006. He was the City of Bellbrook Prosecutor from 1982 until 2006. Prior to that, Steve received a JD from the University of Toledo and a BA from Wilmington College. He is also a Michael's House Foundation Trustee for the Greene County Child Advocacy Center. Steve was instrumental in the development of this center, which supports children who are victims of sexual and physical abuse as they go through the justice system. Michael's House is considered a model for the investigation, prosecution and treatment of child abuse. Steve is also the current chair of State Victim's Assistance Advisory Committee and member of Wilmington College President's Advisory Council. He has volunteered at Carroll and is the former president of Parish Council at St. Francis of Assisi Parish in Centerville.



Lawrence J. Blanford, Class of 1972

Larry has more than 35 years of corporate leadership experience with 7 public companies; most recently as Pres./CEO of Green Mountain Coffee Roasters, Inc. Dale has been recognized for his service by Elizabeth's New Life Center, as well as by the WHIO-TV "Making a Difference" award. Dale has also been praised for his work on social issues with the University of Dayton Campus Ministry team and has had numerous TV, print and radio interviews. He has received grants from the Ohio Governor's Office of Faith-Based & Community Initiatives and the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services. Dale received a BS from Ohio State University and a bachelor degree in Theology from St. Paul University. Recently, Dale established the Nieberding Family Endowment, Carroll's first endowment fund for building and student support.



Dr. Mark A. Stibich, Class of 1991

Dr. Stibich is the Chief Scientific Officer and Co-Founder of Xenex Healthcare Services, the world leader in UV room disinfection systems for healthcare facilities. He leads new technology development and is an inventor on multiple patents. He was featured in Businessweek Magazine (2/21/13) for creating a Hospital-Disinfecting Robot that is now used by more than 200 hospitals in an attempt to solve the world's Hospital-Acquired Infection (HAI) crisis. He was named one of Houston's "40 under 40" top business leaders in 2012 and is regarded as a thought leader in the infection control community. Mark received a doctoral degree from John Hopkins University School of Public Health; a Masters in Health Science from John Hopkins; and a BA in Religious Studies from Yale University.
